The congregation of St. Mark's, Tollington-park, was a peaceful and tolerably united body till a harvest festival set it by the ears. Then the churchwardens, one of whom was High Church and the other Low, began to quarrel, and to-day Mr. Thomas James Dewick, the people's warden, sued Mr. Hunt, the vicar's warden, in the Court of Queen's Benchfor damages for slander.

The slander complained of was contained in a speech made by Mr. Hunt at the 8 6 vostry meeting, where he accused Mr. Dewick of muddling up the church accounts.

The plaintiff, a typical suburban church-warden, dressed in semi-clerical black, that with a black, grizzled beard, deposed and he lives at Sherwood Lodge, Tollington-park, and was people's warden at St. Mark's from 1893. 



I am thankful that the interest in St. Peter's Sunday Afternoon Mens Service continues unabated, and that the various Institutions which have sprung out of it are flourishing. I hope also, that we shall have from among those who have received a blessing at these Services, men coming forward as Communicants, Candidates for Confirmaand Church Workers. In the great harvest field there is always room for zealous workers. I ask your prayers for Mr. Ditchfield in his large Parish where there is much to be done, and also for the Rev. Arthur Hart, who will succeed him here; for myself, for this Parish, and for all our work, that it may be for the glory of God and the eternal and temporal welfare of the people.

THE VICARAGE, ST. JAMES THE LESS, BETHNAL GREEN, E. My DEAR BROTHERS,

I find it extremely difficult to write to you. I can hardly realize that my official connection with you has ceased. After labouring five years with you in the Master's Service, it is a wrench such as no one can imagine, to sever the bond which has united us in the common work for the glory of God and the raising of our fellow men. The past year has been a very trying one to me and yet as I look back I can already see the hand of God guiding all. The time I was absent in the East was in some respects a testing time and a preparation for my removal from amongst you. The sphere of work at Bethnal Green is not of my seeking. I would greatly have preferred to continue the work amongst men which God has so greatly blessed, but the need of the Parish of St. James' and the clearness of the call made it impossible. But God removes the workman and carries on the work and so it will be with you. It is impossible to calculate the work which has been done in the five years—what has God wrought? When five years ago some of us gathered together and determined by God's help to try and reach the men around us, we seemed very few and very weak, but in His hands "the one has become a thousand," and the Gospel of Christ has once more proved that it has the power to attract and hold together masses of men. What reason there is for prayer and thanksgiving! How our hearts ought to

rejoice as we see Sunday by Sunday hundreds of men of all classes and shades of thought congregated in God's house on His day, joining together reverently and heartily in prayer and in praise, and in listening to His Word read and preached. During the five years what large sums have voluntarily been given by the men not only for the work of the Service, but for many outside objects. How many new methods, organizations and clubs have not only been commenced but vigorously worked. Thrift and providence have increased as is seen by the Balance Sheets which will well repay study. Drinking, great though it still is, has been considerably decreased. How many to-day thank God for St. Peter's Men's Service? The changed lives, the brighter homes, the happier wives, the more joyous children, the better observance of God's law and day, these are the greatest and best tokens of progress. How it cheered my heart on my last Sunday night amongst you to see so many men meeting at the Lord's Table rejoicing in the great blessings which God had given to them. How many men are doing real Church work in connection with this movement. Sunday School Teachers do their work, Choirmen do theirs, Church officials do theirs, and the Men of the Mens Service have not been behind any of these in the amount of time, thought and work they have so cheerfully given to this part of the work of God in this Parish. But how much their remains to be done! How necessary it is that all should rally round my successor, the Rev. Arthur Hart, for his is no light task. He will need all the prayers, sympathy and help which it is possible to give. Don't draw comparisons—and if a man is worth his salt he will be different from other men. Don't criticiseremember what I said to you the other Sunday afternoon and muzzle the grumbler, he will deserve it. Give Mr. Hart a warm welcome, and if in the past you have brought one man with you, bring two to hear him-if you have prayed for and had sympathy with me give him double. This Service has worked well on its old lines of trust in God and hard work. It must not go down but up, and if with one heart and mind you rally round Mr. Hart, and look up to the Great Head, a mighty blessing will descend.

In taking leave of you on Sunday next I shall deal more fully with these questions but I cannot forbear to express my thanks to the Vicar for permitting me to carry on this work. He has had the wisdom and the Christian grace to see that if working men are to be won in large numbers to Christ in London it must be one man's work and not two—a dual control or active interference would soon bring anywhere such a movement to the ground, and the Vicar has recognized this, and to him are due the hearty and warm thanks of all connected with the Service for, although giving me a perfectly free hand, he has always by his sympathy and advice been ready to help in any way. To the

Hon. Sec., Mr. A. R. Schirges, the Committee, Orchestra and Choir my deep gratitude is due for their hearty and loyal cooperation in the work, and for continual tokens of love and kindness to me personally. I shall never forget the sympathy shown to me at d my wife during our great sorrow last winter, and both Mrs. Ditchfield and myself have nothing but kindness to remember during the whole period of our life amongst you.

May I ask for your prayers in my new sphere. I am not far from you and shall be always glad to see any of you at any time except on Sunday afternoons, for then you ought to be somewhere else. As for me, my ardent prayer to God is, that all engaged in this work may be given an ever increasing love of prayer, love of God, love of man, ready to increased love of work which shall never weary, but which shall lead us, like the Good Shepherd to go on after the lost until we find them and bring them back to the ever open arms of Christ, our Saviour King. Then praying, working and resting entirely upon God may the future of our Service be a time of rejoicing in Heaven and rejoicing on earth over men and families won to holiness, Heaven and God.

May the Lord bless you and keep you my brothers, may His face shine upon you and be gracious unto you, may He lift up the light of His countenance upon you and give you His peace, is the prayer of

# St. Peter's Men's Service and its Huxiliaries. Aim and Character of the Service. HE aim and object of this Service is to lead men through

Christ to a higher, purer, nobler life in God, and to prove that Christianity is not a failure, but the one thing that can make a true man, yes, a gentleman in the highest sense, being all that he ought to be in himself, and doing all that he ought to do for his brothers. To accomplish this, character of the Service is distinctly a religious one, while at the same time, one in which all can join and thoroughly enjoy. The singing is hearty, for although we have the valuable assistance of a choir and orchestra, to both of whom we are greatly indebted, yet the men are a choir in themselves. A solo, sometimes with a chorus, such as "Will you meet me at the fountain," is sung by a member of the choir, and is always keenly enjoyed. The less on is read by the Committee in turn, every man is provided on entering the Church with a short Liturgy, used by the sanction of the Bishop of London, and which is always most heartily and reverently rendered. The Addresses are varied in character, and homely in style, but always on some Gospel subject as it applies to and meets the need of men in their every day life.

How Worked. By a Committee now numbering seventy, and which embraces men of almost all classes. This is divided into sub-Committees dealing with the various Clubs and Societies. By it the houses in the Parish are visited and an invitation given to the Services. Men are sought out, public houses systematically visited, and yet without incurring the hostility of the publicans, some even taking a personal interest in the Service.

Red Letter Services during the past year.

Such were the occasions when we had Addresses from the Bishops of London, Ballarat, Bishop Oluwole (who gave a telling Address on his native country), Archdeacon of London, Canons Scott Holland, Girdleston, Dr. Welldon, and the Rev. A. R. Buckland. These visits will not soon be forgotten by the hundreds of men who listened to the powerful appeals made to them.

Annual Open Sunday.

The Service is held exclusively for men, excepting that once a year the men are allowed to bring their wives. This annual Service was held on June 20th, when Mr. Ditchfield gave an Address on "How to be happy though —." The Church was crowded to an extraordinary extent; chairs, boards, benches and hassocks, being brought into requisition. No less than £25 4s. was placed in the boxes at the doors and this, together with £15 6s. collected in other ways, yielded £40 10s. for the Prince of Wales' Hospital Fund from the Mens' Service.

The visit of the Bishop of London caused great interest, and the Church was filled with men who listened with great attention to the masterly Address which was founded on answers to the question, "What is a Christian?" At the close of the Service the Bishop took his seat at the Chancel steps, and Mr. Schirges, Hon. Secretary of the Service, read an Address of welcome to the Bishop from the Committee. The Address which was beautifully illuminated and framed was as follows:

"To the Rt. Hon. and Rev. Mandell, Lord Bishop of London: We, the Committee of St. Peter's Mens Service, Highgate Hill, desire to offer a respectful but most hearty welcome to your Lordship on this, the occasion of your first visit to our Service.

The Service to-day, at which your Lordship has been preseent, is the 247th consecutive Sund 19 afternoon Mens Service which has been held since the commencement on October 9th, 1892. During this period these Services have been attended, summer and winter alike, by hundreds of men, and have been the means, by God's blessing, of bringing about in very many, such a change of heart as has borne fruit not only in thrifty and temperate homes within the Parish, but in greater interest and zeal for the glory of God and the good of men. Realizing our own responsibility in the great work, we venture to bespeak from your Lordship the same kind and practical sympathy which was always so freely given by your predecessor, the present Archbishop of Canterbury. Your Lordship s presence here to-day is evidence that we shall not ask in vain. It has been a source of joy and thankfulness to hear of the great blessing which has followed your work in your late diocese, and we shall, day by day, join in

prayer that the Great Head of the Church may be pleased to grant to you such measure of wisdom, power and love, that you may discharge the duties of your high office to the daily extension of the Church of Christ." Signed (here follow the names of over 60 members of the Committee).

The Bishop who was evidently touched and pleased at his warm welcome made a graceful acknowledgment in reply and closed the Service with his blessing.

Clubs, Societies, &c.

(1) The Sick, Burial, and Annual Division Society has been most successfully carried on by a Committee of Messrs. Bryan, Clarke, Dunham, Millen, Neale, Storey, Wall, with Mr. Frampton as Secretary. It is pleasing to note the gradual but steady growth of this useful Society. During the first year, 120 members; second year, 180; third year, 239; fourth year, 300; last year, 383.

This is extremely satisfactory. By payment of 7d. per week a man can insure himself and his wife against death for £5; 10/per week for ten weeks in case of sickness, and in addition have a share in the Annual Division at Christmas. Last year, £1 5s. 2d. per member was returned. Pay night and enrolment of new members, Saturdays from 7.30 to 8.30 in New Parish Rooms.

(2) Thrift Society open to both men and women. Any amount from id. upwards can be received. Interest is given. Open same time and place as Sick Club. Mr. Petford, the Secretary is to be congratulated on the wonderful increase of membership.

First year, 306; second year, 376; third year, 719.

(3) THE CHRISTMAS CLUB proving of benefit last year has been recommenced with Mr. Broadbent as Secretary and Mr. Payne as Treasurer.

(4) THE ANNUAL EXCURSION on July 19th, to Clacton, was greatly enjoyed. A special train was engaged; the weather was fine and everything possible was done to make the visit a thorough success. Such a day is not only beneficial for the change of air it gives, but also for the bringing together of neighbours in friendly intercourse.

(5) The Excursion Club, with Mr. Broadbent as Secretary, was of great service in enabling many to prepare for their day at the seaside.

(6) ORCHESTRAL AND VIOLIN CLASSES, under Mr. Wm. Newbold, are held every Tuesday evening, in the Parish Room, The Classes are arranged for Beginners, Elementary, Intermediate and Advanced. Fee, 5/- per term, payable in advance.

(7) The Saturday Night Entertainments held in the winter, partook more of the nature of high-class concerts rather than entertainments. A short address in the middle is given. Our hearty thanks are due to the many kind friends who gave us such valuable and willing aid. The average attendance was 138, not so large as last year, but still gratifying considering other

attractions and the severe weather. They will re-commence on Saturday, October 16th, at 8 p,m. Admission by Programme, 1d.

- (8) The Saturday Afternoon Excursion Club, under the able guidance of our Hon. Sec., Mr. Schirges, made some most delightful visits during the summer, visiting among other places, St. Alban's, Bedford and Elstow (the birthplace of Bunyan), Bushy Park, Harrow (by the kind invitation of Dr. Weldon). A more pleasant and profitable way of spending a Saturday afternoon, can hardly be imagined than in visiting such spots as these and we hope that next year a still larger number may avail themselves of these Rambles.
- (9) The Annual Social Evening in October was rather spoiled by the incessant rain which fell in torrents all the evening. Those present however spent a most enjoyable evening.
- (10) DINNERS TO POOR CHILDREN. Two years ago the Committee realizing their need decided on opening a Fund for poor children during the severe weather. Each year since they have continued this good work although, owing to the mild winter, the number last year was very small. Mr. Ditchfield commenced the year with a balance in hand of £5 18s. 3d. He has received in addition through Mr. Petford, 16s. from 3 children in Devonshire, whereas the expenditure was only £4 3s. 10d., leaving a balance in hand of £2 10s. 5d. The Committee again take the opportunity of expressing their thanks to Mrs. Osborne for so kindly arranging for the dinners.

THANKS. Hearty thanks are due to the Committee, and especially to our indefatigable Hon. Sec., Mr. Schirges, for the great amount of time, thought and work which they have given to help on the work; to Mr. Herman who in so many ways has rendered valuable aid; to Messrs. Frampton, Petford, Morgan, H. Petford and Tyler who, as Secretaries of the various Clubs have done such great service in the cause of thrift; to Mr. Broadbent, for his invaluable help as Superintendant of the Reading Room; to Mr. Hall, for his able management of the Library? to Mr. A. G. Osborne for his labours in the Lads' Club; and to Messrs. Rowley, Winter, Storey and Kent, for help in various ways; to Mr. Hart, who so well supplied is with good coffee and cake at the entertainments, and to Mr. Thompson for his help in the same way in the Reading Room; to Mr. Clarke, the Verger, who has always helped us so much; and to his son, Mr. A. E. Clarke, for his many kindnesses; to Mr. Cammack, the Organist, and Mr. Wm. Newbold and the members of the Orchestra who have done so much to render the Services successful; to Messrs. Giddy, Dando, Eglin, Davies, Stimpson, Baxter, and others for help on the Saturday

Extract from Mr. Ditchfield's Address at the Annual Open Sunday, June 20th.

How to be happy though — Though what? An Englishman. There is a saying that a Scot is never at home unless he is abroad, an Irishman never at peace unless he is at war, and an Englishman never happy unless he is miserable. Whether this is so or not it is certain there are not as many Englishman as happy as they might be. How to be happy on Sunday! Foreigners think we in England spend our Sundays in a very miserable way. When I was in Paris I saw on the Sunday morning, masons, carpenters, painters, all working away, and then in the afternoon and evening music halls and theatres open and crowds of people streaming in and out. That was their Sunday, that was their day of rest. We in England know better than that, and yet how few people make the best of their Sundays—If you want to be happy on the Lord's day go to the Lord's house. But there are some people who keep others away from Church because they profess so much and do so little. They hinder others by their self-righteousness. But when you come to Church, come seeking for a blessing from the Holy Spirit. This He will give you and it will be a help all through the week.

How to be happy though married: yes, with children! What curious little mixtures they are. They amuse you when they are young and sometimes abuse you when they are old. How often are the gray hairs brought down with sorrow to the grave. But children can be reared to be blessings—how? Don't be too strict. The Puritans were God-fearing men, but their children were the men and women of the licentious period of Charles II. Don't bend the bow too much; but do not be too lenient. Some parents cannot say "No" and keep to it. The little one comes in and asks for something The mother says "No," but a "No" with a "Yes" in it and the child perseveres until it has obtained its desire. Teach your children obedience. Teach them about the love of God. Teach them about Jesus, that He is as real as you are and more loving than you are.

How to be happy though a husband or a wife. Agree together. In Egypt you sometimes see a donkey and a camel harnessed together, and they make a curious and ill-assorted pair. But husband and wife are often a worse. Happiness in married life does not mean that your house must be large and furniture costly. Remember the prophet's house was a very poor and ill-furnished one: a bed, a table, a stool and a candlestick, that was all. To be happy the husband should treat the wife as his wife, not as a mere cook or drudge. Then there must be love to Christ. Christ loves his spouse, the Church, and that is the beautiful type of the husband's love for his wife. And just as the Church loves Christ and obeys Him because she loves Him, so must the wife love her husband and so obey him not of necessity but because of love. A home founded on these lines happy is it. Wives try and understand your husbands. Never tell a man of his faults when he is hungry, wait until his slippers are on and he has made himself comfortable in his seat by the fire and the little one has gone to rest and the pipe is lighted. That is the time to speak—to speak in love not in anger.

But how to be happy though an Englishman. Keep the drink out. Did you ever know anybody happy who kept it in. When I was in Tivoli I saw a crowd of people running along the street, some had mugs, some spoons, others cups and jugs and all sorts of things. A cask of spirits had fallen in the street and burst and the spirit was running away, and the people were anxious to get even a spoonful. Some Englishman are as bad. They watch for the opening of the public house and sorrow when it closes. But are they happy? Is the man who sips—sips from morning to night? Is the woman who drinks happy? If you—your home—your family are to be happy you must keep the destroyer of happiness out.

The Social Meeting at Holloway Hall on Oct. 12th, was a most pleasant re-union, about 900 being present. A lengthy and excellent programme of vocal and instrumental music, together with recitations by Mr. Colebrook and ringing by the Silver Chime Handbell Ringers.

After tea, (which was very expeditiously served by the large staff of stewards, members of the Committee), the Chairman, the Archdeacon of London, asked Mr. Schirges, the Hon. Sec. of the Mens Service, to make a presentation to Mr. Ditchfield, which consisted of a handsomely framed illuminated Address, at the bottom of which was an excellent photograph of the Committee, taken at the Church. The Address was as follow—

To the Rev. J. E. Watts Ditchfield, Vicar of St. James the Less, Bethnal Green.

On the eve of your leaving the scene of your labours during the past six years—

We, the Committee of the St. Peter's Mens Service, commemorating to-day the fifth anniversary of the commencement of these "Services for Men only," desire to offer you an expression of our sincere gratitude and of our deep personal affection. For five years your work has been carried on in spite of difficulties that would have daunted a less strenuous faith and crushed a less hopeful spirit.

But we of the Parish, as well as many beyond its boundaries, have cause to thank God for the ardour and enthusiasm of the "late curate of St. Peter's."

Whilst recognising our inability adequately to express our indebtedness for the work instituted by you five years ago, and carried on till now with a perseverance and zeal that has never flagged, it would ill become us to allow the present occasion to pass without placing on permanent record our gratitude to Almighty God for the great privilege of being permitted, in however slight a degree, to share the burden of your toil, and we desire at the same time to thank you for the quick sympathy, the delicate friendliness, and the ceaseless interest which you have exhibited to us one and all; you have indeed been a brother to us, and as you leave us for another and a wider sphere we join in united prayer that by the blessing of God you may be spared in health and activity for many years of useful life.

Mr. Churchwarden Rushbrooke then handed Mr. Ditchfield a cheque which had been subscribed for by the Parishioners, Congregation, and attendants at the Men's Service generally.

The Archdeacon said that he had watched with the greatest sympathy the work carried on by Mr. Ditchfield, which had been perhaps one of the most prominent of all those efforts made by the Church for her sons, the working men. He expressed his gratitude to the Vicar for the kind and unselfish feeling he has always shown for Mr. Ditchfield's work and for his many years work at St. Peter's. He impressed upon the men present that the future success of the Services depended largely upon their support and assistance though they would have an able successor to Mr. Ditchfield in the Rev. Arthur Hart.

The Rev. J. R. Wood, the Vicar and the Rev, A. Hart who received a warm welcome, also spoke.

The Rev. J. E. Watts Ditchfield, after referring to the wrench it was to part from St. Peter's, spoke with deep thankfulness of the five years he had spent in the Parish, and his cordial relations with the Vicar, the Committee of the Mens Service, and brother workers, like the Rev. J. R. Wood, and the Non-conformists of the district. He had had nothing but kindness and sympathy all round. He thanked the women of St. Peter's, not only for what they had done in regard to the Womens Service, but for the support they gave to the Mens Service in their particular way; and concluded with a hearty wish for the future prosperity of the Services under his successor, Mr. Hart.

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

# St. MARY, HORNSEY RISE. Clothing & Coal Clubs.

The object of these Clubs is to encourage the poor of this neighbourhood in laying by a given portion of their weekly earn hings for the purchase of Coal or Clothing for the winter weather.

With this view, a small premium, of greater or lesser amount, according to the number and regularity of the weekly payments, but never in any case exceeding the sum of 2s. for any one depositing family, is added at the end of the year.

By references to the Statement below, it will be seen that the sum of £29 19 0 is required to meet the Premiums that the Depositors are entitled to for the current year. This amount is somewhat larger than usual, the total value of Goods to be dispensed, being £34 9 6 in excess of last year.

It is hoped that this will not be considered too large a sum to be expended on what is confessedly by far the wisest and most effectual way of helping the poor.

Collections for raising the necessary amount will be made (D.V.) after both Morning and Evening Service on Sunday, November 14th, or Special Offerings towards the same purpose. (see *Deut.* xv. 10 11) may be sent to the Vicar or Churchwardens, by whom they will be immediately and gratefully acknowledged.

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# Report for Year 1896=7.

A LTHOUGH the Church was consecrated and the parish legally constituted more than nine years ago, yet it is only now that this, the first Year Book of the Parish, makes its appearance. The publication of the various balance sheets in the Parish Magazine on the one hand, and the addition to the clerical work of the Vicar, already consuming time and energy that should be given to visiting and study, on the other, are the chief reasons for this delay. Once begun, however, I purpose making the Report an annual one. This first issue is not quite as complete in detail as I should wish it, but this defect will be remedied, all being well, in future Reports.

The list of parochial organisations include three of recent formation, namely, the Younger Communicants' Union, the Instruction Class connected with it, the Men's Bible Class, the Women's Scripture Class, and the Men's Social Club. This list, together with the names of all officially associated with the Clergy as Church Workers, gives a fair idea of our parochial machinery as at present constituted. When I look at it I thank God and take courage. The Communicants should be the spiritual salt of the Parish, and I trust that many more of them will buckle on the harness of active work.

With the exception of the Building Fund and the Land Purchase and Vicarage Funds, the Accounts are either for the year 1896, or for the year ending Easter, 1897. Each will be taken up where it ended, so that the period covered by each statement in the Annual Report will be one year. The Analysis and Summary given in page 17 is for one year, and this remark applies equally to the funds just mentioned.

The Building Fund is in a healthy state; this year will see the debt on our Church cleared off. The Organ, too, will soon be paid for, and it is an instrument worthy of its place. There is much for which to be deeply grateful to the "Giver of all good things." God has blessed and prospered us as a congregation, and He has honoured us by making us the channels of help and blessing to others. To be witnesses for Christ by word and deed is the pleasing duty of all who love Him.

Let me here thank you all, among whom I labour, for your unfailing kindness and ready help; and let me, in your name, thank also those generous Christian souls who have aided us in our efforts by responding to our appeals.

## CLOTHING CARDS, ETC.

Monday, November 8th, will be the last day for deposits, and on that day all cards must be brought in. Depositors whose cards are numbered from 1 to 300 will receive orders on tradesmen on November 22nd, at the Vestry, between 10 and 12; those above 300, on Wednesday following, between 9.30 and 11. To 25 deposits by the head of a family, living in St. Anne's parish, making at least 10s. in the year, for clothing or coal, 1s. is added; to 35, if above 16s., 1s. 6d.; above 40, for not less than 20s., 2s. To each such depositor who has 20 entries on either coal or clothing card, the Vicar in his discretion gives a ticket for the Club Tea, and a second ticket for husband or wife. Non-parishioners have half-bonus, and extra large payments in the last few weeks to ob ain a larger bonus are not counted as properly entitling to it. No card will be given on November 22nd or 24th, except to the member whose name it bears. In case of sickness, or absence from home on those days, cards can be applied for on any later Monday or Wednesday, between 10 and 11, at the Vestry. A coal card must not be used as if it were a second clothing card; it defrauds the clubs and frustrates their objects.






