

Mr. Leale is a man of about 30; dark complexion; clean-shaven; short; with a tossy head of hair. He reminded me of Clem Edwards in appearance; looked pale and tired. A good man, but perhaps not quite up to his task, which ought to be primarily to deal with a parish of sturdy artisans and mechanics.

the Mission District is near the outskirts of London, and is a parish in the making. At present they to
have no church, but a block of temporary Missi n buildings:-church (holding 200) and two rocms, for Sunday
School etc. and Club. He is struggling to raise £6000
for the Church, and finds it "a job" to get it.

that the population is now about 4000, and that it has sone up about 1000 since his arrival. Houses are rapidly springing up, and are occupied as soon as finished—almost before they are finished, one of the complaints with regard to the houses being that they are entered before they are dry and healthy. In this respect at the extreme east, the conditions of the extreme west, at Fulham are being reproduced, except that in Plumstead there is less complaint of sheddy building. except the highest. There are only three houses in which a servent is kept, and two of these are occupied by clergymen. The other is a publican's. Most of the house. holders have a lodger, and the lodger, like the main occupier, is almost invariably an Arsenal hand. There are only six small shops in the whole parish, and these only exist because they are able to tempt a certain amount of custom by offering credit. The bulk of the trade of the neighbourhood is in the hands of the Co-operative Society, which, with its head-quarters at Wool. wich has a very strong branch at Plumstead.

(Note: I passed the bulding on my return to the Sta. tion, large, conspicuous, with a clock tower, and many departments. It looked very flourishing, and included a reading-room. Near it, but wutxing like the Stores, outside Mr. L's district, are a great many shops at which many of his parishioners doubtlessly deal. But the fact remains that here as in Woolwich and the districts lying total the west of Woolwich, Cooperation plays an important part in the life of the district. In this respect Woolwich is unique in London. The nearest approac to it in Greater London is Stratford, where the local society draws a great part of its clientele, from the men at the G.E.R. works. But the Woolwick Society with its various branchs is by far the larger.)

Mr. Leale described the men as being "shy, until when wen, when wen, "first-rate". "But they take a lot of winning". They are friendly enough, but a little inclined to patronise: "very pleased to see you! say they 'll

"very few of these people do go to church". In the evening on Sundays the place is well filled; on Sunday morning, there are perhaps 50 adults there. Altogether with the 200 or so who come to the church, and 300 Sunday School children, he reckoned that the church might be said to "touch" some 500 persons, say one in eight. They have 60 on the communicants; Roll, but they "want looking after". Ir. L. called himslef a moderate High Churchman. A card of the services etc. is inserted at page 35, and this card is the only thing that is printed so far. They have no Magazine "yet".

Mr. Leale works alone, but has two or three distatrict visitors, and 20 Sunday School teachers.

Among the few Social Agencies, he mentioned his club, with 40 men and 20 young men in membership; a be poys' club; cricket club, girls sewing club, and one or two others are mentioned on the card.

Asked as to how he worked with most effect, and to what kind of effort the people were most responstive, this courageous, well-meaning, but not very forcible pioner of the Church, replied that khe he baited his hook in various ways", adding that, "as in ishing, there were many disappointments".

Drinkking is the great difficulty, and "the curse

of Plumstead, besides the public-houses, is the clubs. There are two of these, one "Conservative" and one Mr "Radical", but these names are simply "blinds". The places are simply "drinking hells", and are the ruination of home life. The Radical Club is the larger of the 1 poverty in the district save that which is caused by drink, with the exception of an oceasional breakdown, as from failing heth. For the ordinary sponging or loafing poor, there is no room, for there is no one to sponge on. Casual workers are almost non-existent. Homes are as a rule clean and tidy, except where drinking habits prevail. Thus, there is little want, and since he came wages have been e ceptionally high. But he does not think that more money has done the people much good. There has been more drinking, and more reckless expenditure, but the waves say "we are no richer", and the collections in church are certainly no greater. In all, the people subscribe about £100 a year, about a twentieth of what he has been told the drink > bill for last mear was at the Radical Club.

Naturally, their poor fund is small, about £12 a year. But the few helped are "helped well". Mr. L. has

For nursing a Jubilee Nurse is available.

"It is so well done in the night schools".

The sanitary administration of the district he considred was very fair; health is good, and the chief complaint was the one already mentioned —the too speedy occupation of new houses.

The district is practically free from prostitution, and marriage relations are fairly good. There are three public houses in the parish, and his complaint of the police is that they wink a little at irregularities in management. But there is not much to be said on this score, save to emphasise the fact that there is "a lot of drinking".

Mr. L. mentioned mentioned two very small noncon.

missions in his district. These, with the Church Mission, appear to make up the whole of the religious agencies of the neighbourhood, but it probable that in the adjoining parishes there are mineral stronger centres than here. Dr. Hughes appears to be a strong man, and was mentioned as being a good man to go to for information. Among other things, he has taken an active part in local administration.

The above is the old Parish and Parish Church of charlton, and I called at the Rectory to try and make an appointment with Mr. Swainson, who had sent no reply to the office letter. The rector was in, but also Indisposed, and Miss Swainson recretted his inability to see me. But was not Mr. Booth's letter "something about the poor?" to which query I repled "Yes" and was told, as I had rather expected. "There are no poor in m our parish". Miss Swainson was willing, so it seemed best to get what facts there might be at once, without troubling Mxxxxx her father any further. To a great extent it is a parish of negations :- no Sunday School, "they have the Sunday School at S. Paul's"; no poor; no district visitors, for who could they visit; no magazine: "There would be nothing to say in it"; no report; none, apparently of the ordinary things, save the Sunday services, and two in the week, on Wednesdays and Fridays, "which my father takes"; not even a curate, except "a Sunday curate" who comes on that day to help with the Sunday duty.

ting them verified by her father, and a very queer parish it appears to be. The Rector has been there for 25 years, but his daighter, who has probably lived about

the parish area itself is concerned, there has been lite the social change. A good many houses have been built in the neighbourhood, largely for "one servant people" but the parish remains much the same. The houses are menostly occupied by military men who hold appointments either at the War Office of at Woolwich, and, although individual occupants are apt to change every three or four years, some one of the same class, often to take u the vacated postmx, follows. There is much open ground in the parish, and the Rectory itakk itself has a very large garden, and the rectory field.

The Church is a small one, a picturesque red-brick building, occupying a conspicuous position in Old Charlton. But it stands at one end of the boundaries of the present parish, with the result that the great majority of the "seat-holders" are non-parishioners. To a great extent the congregation is made up of Army people. "In the village there is the butcher, the grocer, **kaxpunk* etc. "of course they come". Thus, the congregation, although well-to-do is not wealthy. "Is the church at Midbrooke the richer of the two? I asked, and got an exclamation for reply: "Oh yes! **thenk* far richer; they have any amount of money there".

I think and not for the altar, when I was shown in, in a dining-room which had plenty of carved black oak furniture and which overlooked a garden that I could not see to the end of. Altogether, the interview was much more picturesque than most, but I think that it suffices, although my informant spoke with diffidence and with some tremor at the idea of a book! She constitted her father once or twice, and I could hear his voice from a room near by, I think the voice of an old man in feeble health. I left the address, and if necessary Mr. Swainson will write on any matter that he thinks his d daughter has omitted. But nothing is likely to come.

The Parish of Holy Trinity, New Charlton, was formed in 1886 out of the Parish of S. Paul, Old Charlton. It is situated on the riverside between Greenwich and Woolwich (about six miles from London Bridge) and has a population of 6,000, mostly labourers at the Royal Arsenal, Siemens' Electrical Works, and the Dockyard. The S.E. Railway forms the southern boundary of the Parish, and makes a very clear dividing line between it and its richer neighbours. Nearly all the Poor of Charlton and none of the Rich live in this Parish, and without help from outside it would be impossible to carry on the work.

Report of interview with the Rev. E.C. Evans Lovicar of Holy Trinity, New Charlton. (E.A.) Oct. 16.00

I saw Mr. Evens at the Vicarage. He is married, keeps four dogs, and appears to live comfortably in a small way. His wife is a tall wxxxxx woman, active in the parish, and possesses probably a stronger will than her husband. The latter is a man of about 40, something under medium height; dark complexion, pale face, shaven, projecting under-lip, but not an unpleasant expression. Appeared honest, rather mild, of fair capacity, and moderate strength of character. Like Mr. Leale, at the Ascension Mission District, he appeared to be hardly a strong enough man for his work.

The following cutting from the Report gives the general features of the parish, which includes the whole of "New Charlton", and, as Miss Swainson told me afterwards, the poorest of the whole of Charlton, New and Ohd, ifixexithe and, for that matter, the greater proportion of the poor of every grade. The population is steadily increasing, and is now put down at ax nearly 7000, but the limit of expansion has now been almost reached. The map appears to show a great deal of available building land, but this is over the main sever creatunder high water level, and the L.C.C. forbids any building on it. The worst part of the parish is the

eastern bit, especially the southern ends of East and West St. Here a thoroughly degraded population is found; the houses are badly built on www soil that is not suitable for dwellings at all, and the district, especially the south end of East St. is locally the notorious, bad bit. Not that there is much crime. It is rather a centre of degraded life, of drinking, and of brutalized life. The people living at the other end of the parish are guite distinct, and the new houses are being occupied by very decent working class folk. Mr. rvans was formerly at Watney St. and later at the Parish hurch, Stepney, with Hoskins, and compares the Tast End. er favourably with the people of charlton. The latter teresting to notice that one of the things complained of, and mentioned as "one of our difficulties" was the factories. In Stepney (every one nearly) works at a dist ance, and enyone who is got hold of can act as a unit, practically isolated from the neighbourhood in which he is living. Not so at Charlton. XXXXX Here the people among whm a man is working are also his neighbours. "Everybody knows" the private life and the Sunday practices of a man. It follows, therefore, since the tone of the Arsenal and of the various factories is adverse to religion, that a man has to fight against an opposing

vans detects the effects of this adverse influence in many ways, but mentioned especially the way in which the boys broke away from him. at Siemens. In spite of what was said about the active bias against the Church, here as elsewhere, xxx the complaint is rather of slackness than of xxxxx antagonism. Wellis a High Churchman, and on Good Fridays has a procession round the parish, with a certain amount of "Protestant" feeling has been stirred, mainly through the John Wilson, the influential Baptist minister at The Woolwich. This feeling of antagaonism was greatly stimulated by the School Board election of this years ago which was fought, and fought bitterly, on the religious question. To a great extent this feeling has died

out, but it smoulders still, and found some expression, for instance, at the last Parliamentary election, when Lord Hugh Cecil was the local Unionist candidate.

Attendances are small, save for the Sunday Schools of which there are three, with an aggregate mem roll of 600, and an average attendance of from 480 to 500.

On Sunday morning, the average is about 100 at the Church, and in the evening about 200. There is also a small mission service in the evening. The Easter communicants numbered 165, and this is about the number on the roll. Regular communicants were put down at about 70 or 80. 500 Magazines are said to be seld every menth.

to house. Relief is given by the visitors, "on the xuth authority of the vicar". It goes mostly to the sick, and comes in an ordinary year to from £30 to £40. Every winter a grant of £15 comes to them from S. Luke's, on account of a Trust Fund that has to be expended in xu coals and bread. They are practically obliged to take the grant, but it is "a great grief" to them, very difficult to administer, and "the ill-feeling" "the strife and bitternnss" roused are apt to last almost through the year.

In its ordinary work, both financial and personal, woly Trinity is a good deal helped by S. German's, Black. heath, and S. James' Kidbrooke.

On the GENERAL QUESTIONS not very much was said.

Ir. E. appeared to think that a good deal of out-door relief was given by the Guardians, whose Infirmary, however, he warmly praised. Sanitary administration is very fair, but the task is a difficult one, owing largely to exceptional difficulty of draining the low-lying parts of the parish, and to the faulty houses that have been put up in the East St. area.

Was thought to be especially shown by the amount of gambling that was allowed on the river banks. On Sunday in mornings small knots of lads can be seen dotted along the river side. It is, however, very difficult to check, unless an adequate patrol is told off for the duty, as the ground is flat and open, and any stranger, constable or otherwise, can always be seen for a long distance.







The early records of Nonconformity in Woolwich are few and brief. In the year 1662, the Rev. John Hawkes was ejected from the Parish Church by the Act of Uniformity. Whether he ministered to any of his flock who followed him in this forced retirement is not known.

After the Act of Toleration was passed in 1629, a small building was erected in Meeting House Lane for public worship. Among the ministers who officiated there we find the name of the Rev. Samuel Oldfield, whose ordination took place on April the 14th, 1698. Following him were the Revs. George Jacombe, Emanuel Ellerke, and Joseph and Benjamin Stokes. On the death of the latter in 1772, the congregation was dispersed.

This had been the only place of worship in the town, except the Parish Church, until the year 1756, when a small Meeting House was erected in Hog Lane for the Baptists.

Upon the revival of religion under Whitfield and Wesley, at the close of the last century, some of the devoted Ministers sent forth by the Countess of Huntingdon visited Woolwich. Among those were the Revs. R. Shrubsole and Cross. Mr. Shrubsole was invited by the "Countess of "Huntingdon to preach in her chapel in the Plumstead "Road, and to superintend its spiritual concerns." This he did for seven months, in the year 1773.

In 1782 the Rev. William Percy, another of the Countess's Ministers, visited Woolwich, "and filled the chapel with a "fine congregation." He was assisted by his brother, the Rev. J. Wilcox Percy, who was the first pastor of the Church.

then formed in Salem Chapel. That Sanctuary was erected in 1798-9. Mr. Percy's ministry extended over a period of twenty-four years, from 1796 to 1820. He left behind him a fragrant memory of unaffected piety and devotion, and his unwearied zeal in doing good."

He was succeeded by the Rev. Thomas James in 1821, whose pastorate continued until 1843, when he resigned. The Rev. J. S. Bright, of Luton, Bedfordshire, followed, who remained at Woolwich until 1847, when he removed to Dorking, Surrey. His successor was the Rev. Dr. Carlile.

On April 5th, 1852, Eight Sunday School Teachers, in connection with the Church at Salem, met together and unanimously passed the following resolution:—"That by the "strength and grace of God, we resolve to establish another "Sabbath School, and, if practicable, another Christian "interest, upon Congregational principles."

On Monday, August 23rd, 1852, this resolution was carried into effect, and the Church was formed, numbering 42 members.

On September 7th, 1852, the temporary Sanctuary in William Street, was opened for divine worship.

On Sunday, April 24th, 1853, the Rev. Samuel Hebditch, of Ashburton, Devon, commenced his ministry as the first pastor of the new interest. He was publicly recognised as such on October 5th, following.

On October 22nd, 1855, Mr. Hebditch resigned the pastorate, and removed to Bristol. He was succeeded, on October 5th, 1856, by the Rev. W. Gill, formerly Missionary at Raratonga, South Sea Islands.

The Congregation increasing, it was decided to erect a more commodious sanctuary, and the memorial stone of the new building was laid on November the 3rd, 1858, by G. A. Lloyd, Esq., of Sydney.

On the 28th June, 1859, the opening services were held, and the beautiful edifice in Rectory Place publicly set apart for the worship of God; the Rev. Samuel Martin, of Westminster, preaching in the morning, and the Rev. John Stoughton, of Kensington, in the evening.

The building, which with the freehold land, involved an expenditure of about £7,000, was entirely paid for by January the 16th, 1866, on the evening of which day, at the New Year's Tea Meeting, the members of the Church and Congregation were able to congratulate themselves on the final extinction of the annually decreasing debt.

On June 22nd, 1868, the Rev. William Gill resigned the pastorate, after a successful ministry of nearly 12 years. He died at Blackheath on August 14th, 1878. A tablet to his memory has been erected in the Church.

Mr. Gill was succeeded on July 18th, 1869, by the Rev. R. W. Carpenter, previously at Devonport, whose public recognition took place on September 9th, following.

On December 19th, 1870, the Rev. R. W. Carpenter, in consequence of ill-health, and much to the sincere sorrow and regret both of himself and people, resigned the pastorate. (He went to his rest and reward on May 16th, 1871.)

Mr. Carpenter was succeeded on the 3rd March, 1871, by the Rev. Thomas Sissons, formerly co-pastor of Bishopsgate Street Chapel, London, whose public recognition took place on the 19th of June, 1871.

On March 18th, 1884, the Rev. Thomas Sissons resigned the pastorate, after a happy and successful ministry of exactly thirteen years, and removed to Beckenham, Kent, having accepted the pastorate of the Church worshipping there.

Mr. Sissons was succeeded on July the 31st, 1884, by Mr. Albert James Viner, of New College, London, whose ordination took place on December 11th, 1884, when the Revs. Dr. Newth, Dr. Evans, A. Rowland, L.L.B., B.A., and Thomas Sissons took part.

On September 3rd, 1896, the Rev. A. J. Viner resigned the pastorate, after a very happy and successful ministry of twelve years, and removed to Oldham in Lancashire, having accepted the pastorate of the Church, worshipping in Hope Chapel. Mr. Viner was succeeded on 20th of February, 1897, by the Rev. Arthur Edward Abel, of Hull, who commenced his ministry on Sunday, 2nd of May, 1897.





Note on the Primitive Methodist Churches, Woolvich Circuit. (E.A.) Oct.25.00.

I called on Mr. Wilkinson, the head of the circuit at 9 Nithdale Road, Plumstead, on the chance of seeing him. He was out, but Mrs. Wilkinson was at home, and, finding that the two chapels were carried on on a xxxxx small scale, I thought it best to get the Plan, and any facts I could without further delay.

of the two Chapels in the Circuit, see Plan, that at Eglinton Road is "considerably the more improvement of the two". It is never, comfortable, and has the larger membership. It is also a much smaller building, and doubtless fits in much better with the scale of things going on.

The membership is about 60; attendance on Sunday mornings is small, but on Sunday evenings they may have an average of about 120 or 130. The open-air service, the "Endeavour", and the Band of Hope are all signs of the relatively greater activity that prevails there. The children at the two Sunday Schools are mostly attended by the children of members, and their size may be to some extent estimated. Mrs. W. could not give me the numbers. At Eglinton Road, in addition to the Chapel, they have school-rooms built underneath.

of a small but flourishing church. The situation is, would be sally, a favourable one. At sun st. in woolwich a very different picture is given. Here they have a much larger chapel, but it is "old, dilapidated, and in a poor way". They have there "a very poor Society", and the 40 members or so are clearly stranded in a bulding that is now too big for them. Here, in addition to the sunday services, "there is nothing but a Sunday School and a week-night service". Mrs. Wilkinson herself generally attends at Eglinton Road, and except for the comparison with the this, "considerably the more tappaxxxxxx important of the two," no figures were forthcoming.

At both chapels the people are of very much the same class, and were described as "rather poor", and as for the most part connected with the Arsenal. The congregations are clearly of much the same class as those attending at the Free Methodist Chapel, and, for that matter, it appears that Plumstead itself would have difficulty in furnishing any other. Among the Primitive Methodists the Chapel at Robert St. is by far the most improtant in this immediate neighbourhood.

Mrs. Wilkinson lives in much the same kind of house as Mrs. Dunckley, but imam with a less cheerful outlook, Nithdale St. being painfully new, with the roadway stil

unfinished. The children were having toa in the kitchen but I was shwon into the parlour, a rather cheerless little room. I hope it was not also Mr. Wilkinson's st study. They have been here for two years, having some to Plumstead from Brighton. Asked which they liked best. Mrs. Wilkinson said that she liked the people here better, "although the place was not so nice". Their church at Birighton was at Hove, and is not, apparently, the most flourishing of the Brighton circuits. At the Woolwich circuit, in spite of the Ampression sunlessness of Sun Street, they appear to feel that they are in the midst of a people who, so far as their own denomination is concerned, in friendly and resposive. Mrs. W. is a rather dull person, and I thought at first that the door was being opened to me by the landlady of a house in which a young unmarried minister was living. It was somewhat a matter of surprise to find that she was his wife, but I dore say that she makes him a good one. She seemed a very respectable person.

term of pasterate. He himself was not a success, and they had a section of members who gave a good deal of trouble, mainly on matters of finance. However, they have now "got rid of the crothhety ones", Mr. Dempster's successor is clearly a great favourite, and things are looking much brighter. On Sunday evenings they sometimes have "as many as a hundred there" and in the mornings, when congregations are always smaller, they may have forty, when "in Mr. Dempster's time there would have been not more than twelve." There is a membership of

abot 60 or 70, and a Sunday School with 125 children.

The new minister is very active as well as very popular, and such a good preacher. He is pushing on things, apparently on the old lines, but with acceptability and this is making all the difference. Poor Mr. Dempster!

They are all working class people, and practically all connected with the Arsenal.

Mr. Dunckley himself is a brass worker, and in the "experiments department". His wife mentioned that the amount of overtime that had been worked of late had interfered a good deal with the work of the chapel. and said that some spell of fourteen weeks her husband had only a single Sunday off. Instead of a 48 hope' week he worked for about 104 hours, and with overtime allowances his wages for a single week were as much as he would ordinarily earn in three. But the strain was too great for him; "it got on his nerves", and he is at present exempted by a doctor's certficate from working any overtime. Yes, there has been plenty of money, but "bother the money, I say; health is best", and good Mrs. Dunckley was evidently pleased that for her husband, at any rate for the moment the time of exceptional pressure is over. She lived in a pleasant little sixroomed house; was vigorous and self-possessed; age 40 or so.
