Report of interview with the ^{Rev.} Canon Murnane, ⁴³
Mission Priest of the Roman Catholic Church of the Sacred
Heart, Knatchbull Road. At the Presbytery. (E.A.) Nov. 15.

Canon Murnane was Canon Keatinge's predecessor as Administrator of S. George's Cathedral; then he was for some years at the church in Red Cross St. where Father Newton is now; three years ago he came here. Everywhere in the past he has won great affection, and the rooms of the Presbytery contain an unusual number of illuminated testimonials ~~which~~, expressing in strikingly warm terms the affection and respect in which he has been held. The Canon has probably well-earned the kindest things that have been said of him, for he has a sweet and attractive nature. He is something like his brother at Bermondsey, but with a greater personal charm. He is slightly older, but has the same Irish manner; the same fluent tongue; the same alert spare figure; ^{showed} and the same friendliness. I ~~xxx~~ remember that one of the priests at Bermondsey said that "Murnane" was a household word among the Catholics in South London, and I can well believe it.

Canon Murnane is finding his task in Camberwell far harder than elsewhere, and is somewhat puzzled, and still more troubled at the little headway that the Church is able to make in the Sultan Street area.

In the Borough he is at home: "When I get there I

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am in a new world; men touch their hats and greet me with respect at every corner; women idling or talking outside a public house will turn their faces away or disappear so that I may not recognise them. He told me of an evening that he had just spent in the Borough to celebrate the fifteenth anniversary of a Girls' Sewing Party. Some six^{ty} had been present, ^{although they are today to get the better lot} "just Borough girls", and he spoke of the feeling of respect, of devotion, of goodness of life that had been mingled with their high spirits and enjoyment. "It was like a party of girls from Brittany or Ireland". The good Canon could not say enough to describe the happiness of the evening's experiences, and wished more than once that I could have been there. "We bubbled over" said he, in delighted memory, "I was in the third heaven".

Here in Camberwell he misses, alike in the poorer streets and in the meetings of the poorer Catholics that he can get together, all this friendliness and respect. The men watch him stolidly as he passes; the women, brazen-faced, look on unabashed. So far, he has been able to win neither the recognition of his authority nor a friendly response.

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Although at first he spoke of all this with an air of perplexity, when I mentioned S. John's it became clear that the Canon found in the work of the Anglican clergy and Sisters the chief explanation of the disappointing recognition and reception of the Catholic priests. There is confusion in the minds of the people between "parson" and "priest"; in conversation an unusual hesitancy and reserve are noticeable; the Protestant children are taught to call themselves Catholics; the Sisters of the Anglican Church look like nuns, and the Anglican clergy move about ~~among~~ among the people with cassock and girdle so that "we have to take quite a second place" so far as dress is concerned. The general result is confusion of mind, and clearly the effect on character is not thought to be very beneficial. Regret, rather than irritation was betrayed in the Canon's tone; he admired the zeal of the people of S. John's, but he clearly thought that the general result, both among the Catholics and non-Catholics of the district left much to be desired, and that, so far as the Catholics themselves came under this strong local influence of another church, the results were disturbing and harmful. Even among the children of the Catholic school especial care has to be exercised, for if the parents are put out, they would in

many cases be as likely as not to take them away.

They are starting a good many things; a Club, which has from 60 to 80 members; a Boys' Brigade; a branch of the League of the Cross etc. but nothing, not even the religious meetings, are very successful so far. However, the Canon has not been here for very long, and, if his health holds, and he is not too much taken up with diocesan work, I should expect him to conquer in the long run, for his is a very beautiful and winning nature. For the moment however, indifference and apathy confront him, the like of which he has never come across.

It is of this he has a good deal to do, and, for instance, has not been able to visit as much as I might.

The Sultan Street area, with its 800 names on the Catholic register, and an estimated total of 1000 souls, "if we knew them all" is quite different from the rest of the parish. Elsewhere the people are scattered; there is no other congested Irish bit; the classes, too are very mixed, ranging down from doctors to labourers. The total census for the whole of this large parish is about 3500, the mixed and scattered classes thus numbering about 2500.

They have three priests, and, for the last 18 months seven or eight Sisters of Bermondsey, who both teach and visit, and whose advent to the parish is greatly welcomed. The Canon is hoping that a larger number may come before

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long. There is a small branch of the Soc. of S. Vincent de Paul, with six members, and, somewhat exceptional, one of the Soc. of S. Elizabeth of Hungary, which does a very similar work to that of the Vincent de Paul, but for women. There are from 12 to 15 members.

BUILDINGS: Church; Schools; Club rooms; "Money is a difficulty" as, although the people are generous they are none of them wealthy. Local patriotism is strong, and they are not a begging set from outside, nor is Camberwell a good name to beg with, and the needs of the Sultan St. area are apt to be forgotten by the outside world. In the Borough he always had enough money, but here, apart from the congested ~~xxx~~ bit, we are, as one of them put it "a set of genteels". They are handicapped, too, by interest charges of ^{nearly} ~~xxxxx~~ £250 a year.

There are four masses on Sunday, and an average attendance of from 12 to 1300, including some 300 children. A large proportion of those who come are converts; he thinks that at least one half are either such, or the children ~~of~~ of converts. Two-thirds of the young men in the sacristy are converts. They have always a large number on hand, in one year as many as 100. In his predecessor's time the maximum was 50. I asked if there was any special local cause of this large number of converts, and he

thought that the teaching at S. John and S. Agnes might "have something to do with it". They prepare the way, for if such difficulties of the Roman Communion as the Real Presence and Confession are done away with by the Anglicans, as is the case here, a good many people are inclined to think "Why not join the Roman Church itself". To the evening service some 400 come on an average, and these include many non-Catholics.

On the general question~~s~~ of the position of the Roman Catholic Church, Canon Murnane considered that, since numbers kept up, real headway was being made. His argument was that the leakage among the Roman Catholic poor was "enormous", large numbers drifting down each year into the great mass that would be ^{either} absorbed in any statistics of the Church of England, which ~~is~~ ^{is apt to be} any unclaimed ~~residuum~~ ^{residuum}. But many of these people are ~~xxxx~~ ^{xxxx} of Irish descent, and are ^{more} Roman Catholics than anything else. However, the fact of leakage remains. The first, and generally the second generations of Irish are all right; "as long as the old Biddys remain" lapsing is unlikely. But later the danger ~~xxxxxx~~ ^{xxxxxx} begins, and they often forget that they are Catholics, just as they often forget the letter H, an offence of which their ancestors would have been incapable. If, in spite of this loss of ~~the~~ large

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numbers among the cockney Irish, the totals are maintained, the Canon argues that the Church is making headway. (I omitted to ask him whether the aggregate or the percentage was being maintained). He has great hopes for an improvement as regards the children of the poor in the future through the increasing attendance at the R.C. School.

One obstacle to which others have referred was much emphasised by the Canon, namely the inequality of the marriage laws, and their intricacy. His claim is, of course, that the R.Cs. should have the same facilities as the English Church. As things are at present, there is constant danger of R.Cs. going either to an English Church or to the Registrar. Sometimes they may go to neither, and a worse thing befall. Outside the R.C. church, he considers that there is a great deal of most blameworthy slackness. As for the Registry Offices, a man "could marry his grandmother" if he wished to.

Speaking of his own people in the Sultan St. area, he said that there was a good deal of cohabitation, but "they are far better than their surroundings". Such laxity would be "very rare in the Borough" among their people.

Most of the Relief is apparently given privately, and largely by the priests. He never keeps any accounts, as

Italians, he said, but in many ways "it will take us a hundred years to catch them up". He deprecated pessimism, but feared that we were bringing up a generation that was dangerously free from authority either civil or ecclesiastical. He praised the English Board Schools as educational centres, but thought that they failed as influences. "You must" he said "have either spiritual influence or the police; it is better if you can have both". But if you have neither, then you must expect to have the kind of outbursts that we are having in London now; the vulgarity, the disorder, and worse.

I said something about our being as a nation honest, and he agreed, recalling the fact that he had lost three or four pairs of socks in Italy! But still, they were so quiet, so respectful, "even in Rome, under conditions, that at least do not commend themselves to my mind", so polite! The dear Canon! I think that the Sunday evening before he had walked down the Peckham Road and seen the pushing of young men and women, and the rough embrace. "Such conduct would not be tolerated abroad", and the contrast jarred, and made him speak as he did. Doubtless, there is something in his view; perhaps a Catholic people is even apt to behave with greater decorum than others, in the public places. As a nation we are not polite,

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but as a rule the socks are safe. But who would grudge this excellent and dear priest a little dirge, and a little sighing for the revival of the authority of Mother Church? At heart, as he said, he is no pessimist.

Mr Ayllett is a respectable, frock coated,
man of about 50-55, who lives in the
Cold Harbour Lane. Beard & whiskers turning
gray - Middle height.

The Sunday schools are Sunday schools
only because they fail altogether in in-
ducing the adults of the neighbourhood
to come to religious services. This winter a

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a fresh effort is to be made. A brass band²
is to be started, some big speakers are to be
invited to speak on Temperance 'so as to
give the new project a good send-off'.

Mr. Aylett says it is easy enough to get men
to political meetings. Himself he wd be very
liberal in the interpretation of what is a religious
service. He wd speak freely about such things
as the Housing Question & have lanterns &
plenty of music.

The majority of the neighbourhood are labourers,
especially in the Building trade; hose keepers,
cabmen, carmen, bus-drivers, carwashers. 'Natty
men who will do rough work. The women are
laundry workers & a good many hang about & do
nothing! young women go to tie factories.
The worst street by far is Hampton Avenue. The

The labourers are often out of work: he knows this from the number of applicants for bread & grocery tickets.

Knows one 4 roomed house, old, dilapidated, 4 r. 8/6. in Waterloo St on the N side near their school which faces Sanson St.

Sunday school. 9-45 to 10.45. 127 chrs come. followed by children's service. about 70 stay for this: he allows a short interval for a 'chatter'.

2.45-4: afternoon school. 349 come - those who come in the morning wd. come in the afternoon. The ages are between 4 to 16. Children sort themselves: poor sit next poor, well dressed next well dressed: the gutter children don't come: only occasionally a child has to be spoken to for being dirty: the

The bulk are well dressed, nicely behaved children. Some stay away if they have not sufficient good clothes. A few of the parents are church members. The school is very popular. Voting in summer. Dinner for boys at Xmas. Mr. Christie (auntineer) gives a dinner this year to 500 of the poorest boys at the Baths in Church Street. Girls also have a Xmas tree party.

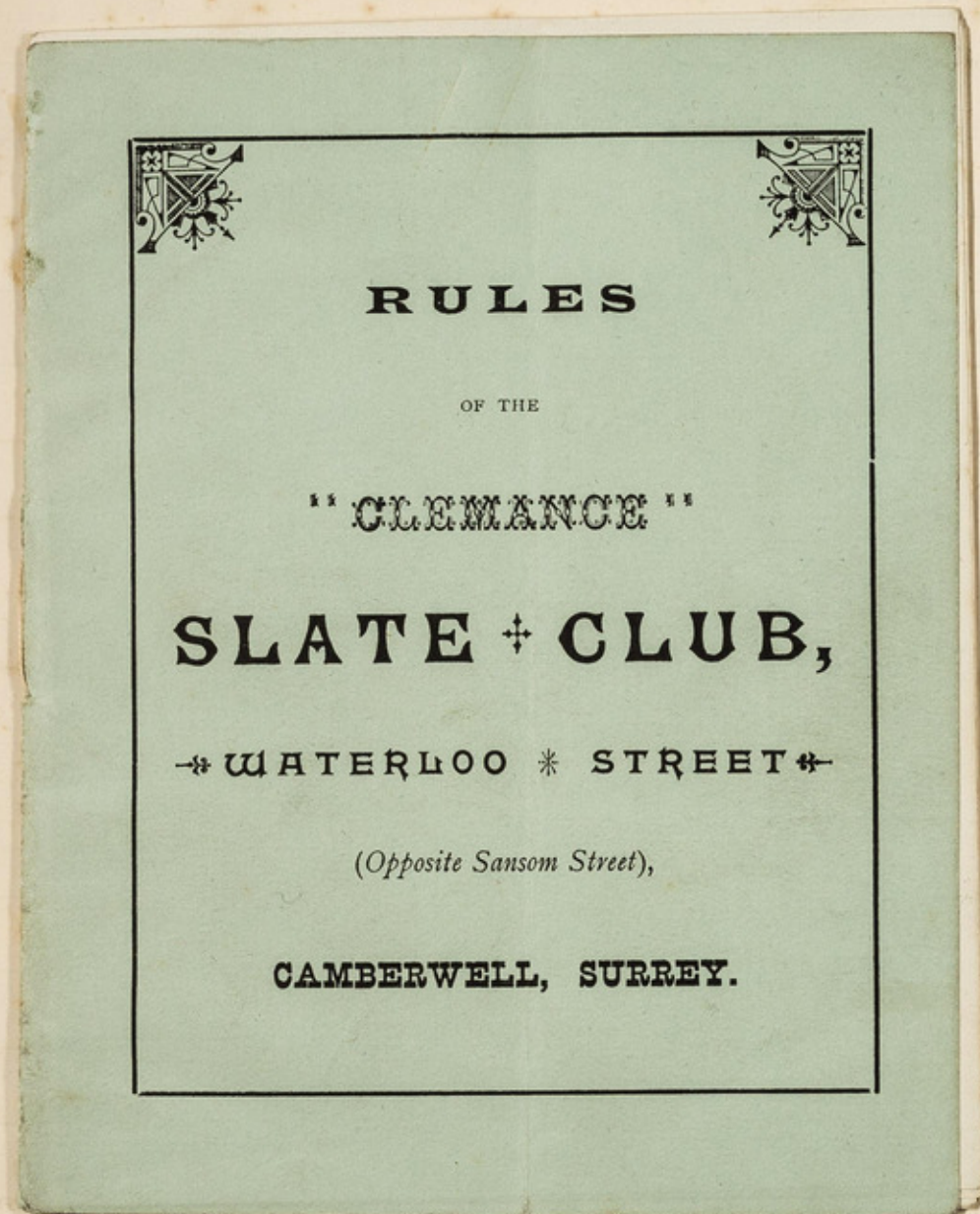

RULES.

Constitution, Aim and Meeting.

1. This Club be called the "CLEMANCE SLATE CLUB" and be managed by a President, two Trustees, Treasurer, Secretary, and a Committee of nine Members, to be elected annually, three of whom shall not be eligible for re-election.

2. The object of the Club shall be to make provision for the mutual benefit of its members in such manner as hereafter stated.

3. The meetings be held in the Club Room every Saturday night from 7 till 10.

Town District.

4. The town district of this Club shall be defined by a line drawn along the following streets or roads, and all members residing in any of the under-mentioned streets or roads, or within the circle thereby described shall be considered as town members:—starting from St. George's Church, Boro', along Great Dover Street, Old Kent Road, New Cross Road, New Cross Gate, Queen's Road, St. Mary's Road, Evelina Road, Nunhead Green, Nunhead Lane, across Peckham Rye to East Dulwich Road, Goose Green, Lordship Lane

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East Dulwich Grove, Half-moon Lane, Herne Hill Station, Dulwich Road, Effra Road, Brixton Road, Kennington Park Road, Newington Causeway to St. George's Church. All members residing outside the circle above described shall be considered country members.

Membership.

5. Any man, except members of the Police Force, between the age of 17 and 40, if in perfect health, and not suffering from any chronic or constitutional complaint shall be eligible to become a member of this Club. He shall be nominated by a member at any meeting, and present himself for election by the Committee. Each candidate for membership must sign Declaration A (see page 14). In any case where the Committee deem it advisable, they may demand a doctor's certificate. All members marrying subsequently to their election shall, within four weeks of their marriage sign Declaration B (see page 15), or forfeit all claim to the death levy. Any member nominating a candidate knowing him to be suffering from chronic disease shall be expelled from the Club, together with such new member.

Subscription, Fines, &c.

6. Each member shall pay 1s. entrance fee, and 6d. per week subscription, or 7d. per week with medical attendance. A subscription card be supplied for which he shall pay 2d. No money to be received without the production of the card. He shall also pay an ad-

ditional 2d. for a copy of the rules. Any member being three weeks in arrear shall on the fourth week be fined 1d., and 1d. for each succeeding week; at the end of the eighth week the Secretary shall send such member a special notice, for which the defaulter shall pay 2d. Should such member not come forward and reduce his arrears within four weeks after the receipt of such notice he shall be excluded and forfeit all claims upon the Club. All fines, including contribution to the Management Fund, to be paid by the end of every third month, or a further fine of 3d. will be incurred. Any member not clearing the books by the last meeting night before sharing, shall be fined 1s.

Any member not making a payment within the first eight weeks of the year shall be taken to have resigned his membership, and his name shall be erased from the roll without notice.

Sick Fund.

7. Members falling ill shall send a notice in writing Declaration C (see page 16) to the Secretary, together with a doctor's certificate stating the nature of the complaint, or they will not be entitled to any benefit. Sick pay to commence from the date of the medical certificate provided it reaches the Secretary's house before four o'clock on the day on which relief is claimed. If, while on the funds of the Club, a member is advised by his medical attendant to go into the country, it must be stated on the certificate, and in all cases the nature of the illness must be fully stated by the medical attendant.

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While in the country the sick pay sheet must be signed by the medical attendant every seven days. If this rule is not complied with, no payment will be made. On his recovery, and before resuming work, he shall send a notice in writing Declaration D (see page 16) stating the date on which he declares off. All declarations to be sent to the Secretary's residence, with the number, name, and address of the member declaring on or off the funds. No sick pay will be allowed for a less period than two days. Country members while on the funds must obtain the signature of their medical attendant to the sick pay sheet every week. The sick pay will be sent at the member's own expense. The sick benefits of this Club shall be 10s. per week for six weeks, 5s. per week for a further period of six weeks, always provided that there are sufficient funds in hand; if not, the amount in hand shall be equally divided amongst the sick members. A member must be clear of the funds for twelve weeks before he can receive full pay again, and no member shall receive more than £6 in one year. No member suffering from any complaint or disease brought on by his own misconduct, or through intemperance, shall receive any benefit from the funds of the Club. No member shall receive any benefit (except death levy and medical attendance) until he has been a member six weeks, and shall have paid six weeks' subscription. Any member owing four weeks' subscription or 2s. for fines, shall not be eligible for any sick benefit from the Club until one week after the arrears are paid. If any member shall, while on the funds of the Club, be absent from home before 9 a.m. or after 5 p.m. between the 1st October,

and the 1st April, or before 8 a.m. or after 8 p.m. between the 1st April and the 1st October, he shall for the first offence be fined 2s. 6d., and for the second offence be expelled, and forfeit all moneys he has paid to the Club. Any sick member seen intoxicated, or found following his usual or any occupation, shall, on proof of such offence, be expelled from the Club.

Death Fund.

8. On the death of a member or a member's wife notice in writing shall be sent to the Secretary at his residence, accompanied by a proper medical certificate of the cause of death, and in each case by their marriage certificate. On receipt of such certificates, each member shall pay the sum of 1s. on the death of a member, and 6d. on the death of a member's wife, in addition to his weekly subscription, within one month or be fined 3d., and 1d. for every succeeding week until paid. The gross amount to be paid to the widow or member as aforesaid, or to such representative as the Committee shall approve, within fourteen days after death, provided such member does not owe eight weeks' subscription at the date of such death. Not more than £12 on the death of a member, and £6 on the death of a member's wife will be paid, and no member will be entitled to receive two death levies in one year. When the membership exceeds 200, a levy will be made only as occasion requires. On the death of a member his widow shall be allowed to receive a due and proper share or dividend calculated as at the time of such death.

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Reserve Fund.

9. All entrance fees received from new members shall accumulate and form, with the interest accruing thereon, a Reserve Fund, to be invested in the same manner as the ordinary funds (see Rule 13). Such Reserve Fund shall be drawn upon only in the following cases:—

- (a) When a death shall occur.
- (b) When the ordinary funds available for sick pay shall have become exhausted.

In each of the above cases the amount so withdrawn from the Reserve Fund shall be repaid as soon as there is a sufficient amount standing to the credit of the ordinary funds.

Management Fund.

10. Each member shall pay 6d. per quarter to a Management Fund.

Benevolent Fund.

11. That a sum equal to 2d. per member on the books, shall, at the end of each quarter, be taken from the Management Fund, and form, with the interest accruing thereon, a Benevolent Fund to be invested in the same manner as the ordinary funds (see Rule 13). Such fund shall be administered by the Committee in such manner as they shall think fit for the relief of distressed members, either by:—

- (a) The grant of small temporary loans not exceeding £1.
- (b) A donation to the Surgical Aid Society or some other similar society of such a sum as the Committee shall approve.
- (c) The grant of a special donation.
- (d) In such other way for the benefit of the members as the Committee shall from time to time determine.

Should the balance standing to the credit of this fund exceed the sum of £66 at the end of any financial year, such excess shall be transferred to the Management Fund.

Medical Officer.

12. A Medical Officer shall be appointed annually by the members at the general meeting in December (who shall be eligible for re-election). Should any vacancy occur, the Secretary, under the direction of the Committee, shall summon a special meeting of the members to fill up the vacancy. The duties of the Medical Officer shall be to examine candidates for admission as members (when requested by the Committee to do so), to give certificates required by the Rules, to visit sick members when necessary, and supply them with medicine free of charge. He shall not be required to visit members residing outside the town district; and shall be entitled to remuneration out of the funds at the rate of 1s. per quarter in respect of each member contributing to the medical fund, such remuneration to be paid

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quarterly. Members requiring medical attendance at at their homes must send word to the Medical Officer before 11 o'clock in the morning or as soon as possible. The Medical Officer can be seen at his residence from 9 till 10 in the morning, and from 6 till 9 in the evening. Each member must produce his card of membership to the Medical Officer on each visit.

Treasurer.

13. The Treasurer to receive the members' subscriptions and contributions from the Secretary to whom he shall give a receipt. The money so received shall be invested in the names of the two Trustees and of the Treasurer in the Post Office Savings' Bank, or as may be directed from time to time.

Committee.

14. The duties of the Committee shall be to attend on their monthly meeting night, any special committee meeting to which they may be summoned, and also, in rotation, to attend with the Secretary at the Club-room every meeting night, to act in conjunction with the Stewards in assisting the Secretary. Each member of the Committee shall receive the sum of 1s. for each attendance. Any member failing to attend shall be fined 6d. for each time he is absent.

Secretary.

15. The Secretary shall collect subscriptions and contributions from the members, and enter the amount

paid by each member in the books of the Club kept for that purpose, for which service he shall receive 3d. per quarter from the Management Fund in respect of each member on the books during the quarter. All money received by the Secretary shall be paid over to the Treasurer.

Stewards.

16. A ballot will take place at 9 o'clock on the last subscription night in the months of January, April, July, and October in each year for the election of two or more Sick Visiting Stewards and two Check Stewards. No member shall serve in the office of Steward more than once in the course of a financial year. Each Steward shall receive a sum equal to and at the rate of 3s. 4d. for each month of service. The duties of the Check Stewards shall be to assist the Secretary in receiving the contributions, and the duties of the Sick Visiting Stewards shall be to take the sick town members their pay before 8 o'clock on Saturday evening, and in addition visit them at least once in each week while on the funds of the Club. In case of illness the Steward must provide an efficient substitute, and give immediate notice to the Secretary. No Sick Visiting Steward shall be required to visit any sick member suffering from a contagious disease. Any Steward neglecting his duties shall be fined 6d. for each offence.

Auditors.

17. Three Auditors shall be appointed at the meeting held the first Saturday in December, to audit the ac-

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counts of the year. Each Auditor shall receive the sum of 10s. for his services.

Annual Division.

18. At the Annual Meeting, to be held the third Saturday in December, the divisible balance of the funds shall be declared, and divided amongst the members in proportion to the period of their membership. Each member shall leave 1s. to meet outstanding liabilities. Any Member who shall be upon the funds at the time of the annual division shall be entitled to full benefits of the Club as provided for by the rules.

Removal from Town District.

19. Should any member remove from the town district prior to the division of the funds, his fair share of the liabilities of the Club during his membership may be calculated, and deducted from the amount he has paid in, and the balance handed over.

Change of Residence.

20. Any member changing his residence shall send notice thereof to the Secretary within fourteen days or be fined 3d.

Settlement of Disputes.

21. All questions which cannot be settled by these rules shall be decided by a majority of the members present at a special meeting called for that purpose.

Interruption of Meetings.

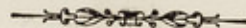
22. Any member swearing or making use of obscene language, or interrupting the business at any meeting of the Club shall be fined 6d. for each offence.

Alteration of Rules.

23. These rules shall not be altered or rescinded, except by a majority of the members present at a special meeting convened for the purpose.

Business Meetings.

24. Seven days' notice be given of the calling of any special or extraordinary meeting.

R E P O R T

IN presenting the Twelfth Annual Report, the Committee have again to congratulate the Members upon the completion of another year's successful work, as the following figures will show that, although we have not approximated the last year's record, steady and continued progress has been made.

The year commenced with a Membership of 1078, to which 279 new names were added, thus making a grand total of 1357 Members. 5 have died; 1 expelled; 3 shared out; 92 resigned, and 84 were removed for non-payment of subscriptions, thus leaving a membership of 1172, or a nett gain of 94 Members.

As will be seen from the annexed account 5 Members and 8 Wives of Members have died during the year. To those whose homes have been thus darkened by the sable wings of the King of Terrors we tender our deep sympathy and heartfelt condolence.

The total amount received during the year was £2056 17s. out of this £358 15s. 10d. was paid away for sickness and £108 for death claims.

It will be noticed that the dividend paid out is smaller this year than usual. This has been largely, if not entirely, brought about by the additional Sick Pay which it will be noticed amounts to nearly £85 more than last year. The Committee do not, however, take a gloomy view of this state of affairs, as they realise that the past year has been an exceptionally unhealthy one, and also that it was to provide a sick fund that the Club was primarily established. The Committee consider there is cause for profound thankfulness that we have been able to meet the necessity, and alleviate the need of our unfortunate brethren.

The amount of money which each Member has sunk during the year is 8s. 9d., or about 2d. per week. For this small outlay each Member has had:—

- (a) His own life insured for £12;
- (b) His wife's life insured for £6;
- (c) A sick benefit of £6;
- (d) The benefit of the Benevolent Fund; and
- (e) All the advantages of a good Social Club.

It will thus be at once recognised that the additional expenditure has entailed the loss of less than $\frac{1}{2}$ d. per week to each Member. Even with the increased outlay the Life Insurance Branch of our work (apart from Sick Pay) is managed at a cheaper rate than the tariff charged by any Industrial Life Insurance Society.

At the end of the Club accounts will be found certain statements and figures which it is thought might prove of interest to the Members. Both the Women's Slate Club and the Clemance Cricket Club are worked independently, and are not in anyway subsidized by our own Club.

The three Members of the Committee who by Rule retire this year and are not eligible for re-election are Messrs. W. Barriball, H. Larken, and G. Whitnall, and for their untiring devotion to duty we give most hearty thanks.

In conclusion the Committee would again draw the attention of Members to the great advantages of united and concerted effort, and would urge upon each one the importance of doing his utmost to advance the interests of our Club, increase its sphere of influence, and cement the kindly brotherly feeling which has existed amongst us for so long.

Report of interview with the Rev. H. Mann, Minister of the Methodist Free Church, Bellenden Road, Peckham. At his residence, 6 The Gardens, Peckham Rye. (E.A.)
 Nov. 15.00. H3
H-15.

Mr. Mann has been here for $3\frac{1}{2}$ years, having come to London from Newcastle. He is a man of about 45; average height; German-looking, round-faced with long walrus moustache; spectacled. He wore slippers () time of interview 1.30 () smoked; seemed an ugly, sincere, and fairly capable man. In addition to being the minister of this church he is Sec. of the London Chapel Extension Fund of the Denomination (see Report) and says that either the Chapel alone or the secretaryship is one man's work.

The chapel is one of others in this district that ~~is~~ having to contend against local influences that make the task of running ~~a~~ church increasingly difficult. The district is, he said, "degenerating" socially, and he instanced the houses in "The Grdens" as types of those that could no longer as a rule attract people who could occupy a whole one. Rents are £50 a year, and "people who can pay this prefer to go further out". It is to people of this standing that the Chapel looks for its chief support, and the result of the change is that although "numerically a little stronger, financially they are weaker". They have a grant of £40 from the Chapel Fund,

but apparently this cannot be relied upon permanently. Otherwise they are self-supporting.

He described the congregation as being for the most part "a grade above working-class", with a certain number of this class.

Members 120; Sunday morning congregation, 100; evening, 200. The Chapel, a substantial building (see cover of Magazine) holds 480, exclusive of galleries for which it is designed, but which have not yet been put in -- perhaps never will be. For, as he said, "things are getting more difficult", and the very chapels that are being built further out by the Fund of which Mr. M. is Secretary help to accentuate the strain on chapels situated like the one in Bellenden Road. In addition to the Chapel, the block contains a lecture hall and two School-rooms.

The Magazine gives a list of a fair number of workers, and these include 27 District Visitors and 28 Sunday School teachers. A certain amount of stir is being made here, as in so many other of the Free Churches, in preparation for the Simultaneous Mission to be held at the beginning of the New Year.

1000 Magazines are distributed every month, and this is one of the duties of the district visitors, who also

"find out the sick and needy", and invite those who attend nowhere to come, if they will to Mr. Mann's church, and if not there, somewhere. This visitation is carried on in the district allotted by the local Free Church Council. It was admitted that the district was over-churched and Mr. M. said that there were 8 or 10 within half a mile of the one in Bellenden Road. New people are called on, and "We say jocularly among ourselves that we are on the doorstep before the furniture van has left". This visit is paid on observation, or on report from the District Visitors, but "the Church of England goes one better; we generally find that we are second". This vigilance, which he admired appeared to be shown especially by Mr. Haslam's church -- S. Saviour's.

In addition to this keen local rivalry and to the local changes, Mr. ~~XXXXX~~ Mann mentioned the difficulties arising from "indifference; Sunday-breaking; and, in summer, the band on the Rye".

He was interesting on the difficulty of retaining a hold on their children and young people, because of the reasons that he gave: their Band of Hope has been almost broken up by the attractions of a Cantata that is performed at the Bellenden Road Board School, and that draws away the children to the practices. This is a dif-

ficulty so far as the younger scholars are concerned, while those of a somewhat larger growth, who ~~xxxx~~ might otherwise have been expected to join the Christian Endeavour, are found to be going off to the Evening Continuation Classes. Mr. ~~xxxx~~ Mann blames no one, but simply regrets that the work of the Chapel should be touched prejudicially by agencies that are in themselves so excellent.

Sunday School: Register, 320; Average, 220. *Very successful.*
RELIEF: "not much".

A SLATE CLUB with 280 members meets at ~~xxxxxxx~~ one of the rooms belonging to the Chapel. The Officers and Trustees are appointed by the church. Last year, Sick claims, £70; Death, £80; Distributed at end of year, £370.

Mr. Mann spoke of the much greater interest that he found shown by men in Newcastle in "organized Christian work". In London he is greatly impressed by the difficulty of reaching them, and thinks that they are becoming more and more detached. He professed to have a growing conviction of the need of the revision of the presentation of the Truth, and I wondered whether I was to hear a startling statement of bold heterodoxy. It proved to be nothing of the sort. "The Truth must remain. The Gospel

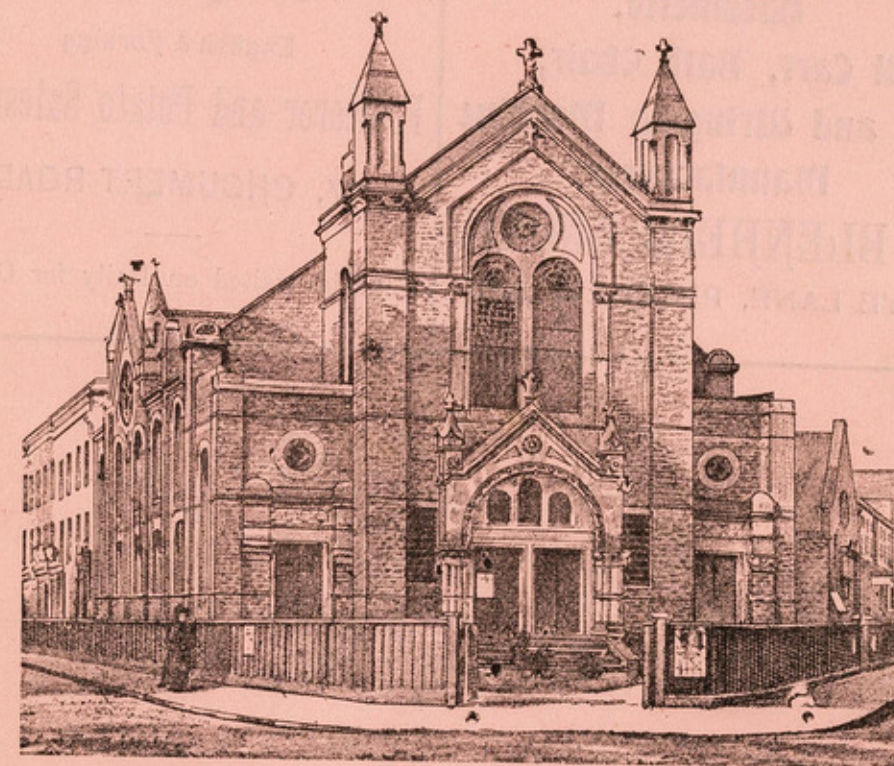
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is necessary". But old phaseology must be given up to a great extent. It is inexpedient, for instance, to speak of "sanctification" or "regeneration". "If we turn to Wesley's writings the last word, ~~for instance~~, is found on almost every page. But nowadays we must speak of the necessity of becoming a new man". This seemd rather a poor illustration of a revised presentation of the Truth, but the general idea in Mr. Mann's mind appeared to be, that the pulpit must be simpler, and in a sense more conventional in its diction. Above all "we want to apply Christianity to the worker's life." In short Mr. Mann is tending towards "Christian Socialism". He is somewhat of a heavy-weight, moves slowly, and perhapa will never get there. But he is rather a good fellow.

REPORT, 1900.

THE work of this Committee becomes more onerous and responsible year by year. The rapidly growing suburbs on both sides of the Thames, with the constant migration from the centres and the ceaseless immigration from the provinces make it impossible for the Committee to slacken in their activities. The work intrusted to them assumes two phases, the fostering and strengthening of the Churches organised or aided by the Fund, and the initiating new openings in districts where we are unrepresented. Both these departments of service have occupied the minds and energies of the members of the Committee during the year. To this work the Committee has brought an amount of intelligence, earnest inquiry, and self-sacrifice of the most praiseworthy character. Their regret is that their financial resources are so inadequate. The support that they receive is very small compared with the hugeness of the task that faces them. Their income ought to be, and must be, largely increased, before they can deal satisfactorily with the ever-growing problem of the religious needs of the metropolis. The time is not far distant when a Secretary will have to be set apart, to devote the whole of his time to this work, to advocate the claims of the Fund, secure donations and subscriptions, and generally watch over the interests of the Churches.

During the year the Committee have had many applications for assistance, some of which have been granted, but others have had to be deferred. Much time has been spent in consultation with trustees or building Committees. Deputations have viewed and reported on available sites. Inquiries have been made respecting new openings, and the reports carefully considered. The information acquired by the Committee deepens their conviction that the work must be pushed on with increased energy.

THE CHURCHES AIDED BY THE COMMITTEE are active and progressive.

SHERNHALL STREET has outgrown its accommodation, and the foundation stones of the new Church were laid on Easter Monday, nearly £800 being raised by the proceedings. The Church will cost £6000, and towards this amount this Committee have promised £1000.

The LIGHTHOUSE Church still holds its reputation as one of the most energetic Churches in London. Its energies are now being directed towards the building of new Sunday Schools at a cost of £3000. In aid of this effort the Committee have promised £500.

MANOR PARK Church is still growing and is energetically led. The members are united, enthusiastic, and aggressive, and are well organised.

The HARBOUR LIGHT Church is doing excellent work in a neighbourhood in which there is much hard soil. It is gratifying to record that the debt on the building has been paid off during the year.

STREATHAM Church has had a prosperous year. Plans for the new building have been passed, and the Committee have promised £1000 towards the estimated outlay of £6000.

The small chapel at EAST HAM is crowded out, and plans have been accepted for a new Church to cost £3500. The Committee have voted £1000 towards this scheme.

A new structure at ILFORD has also become a necessity, and the Committee have sanctioned plans for a church to cost £4000, and promised £1000.

The Church purchased from the Congregationalists at PARK CRESCENT ROAD (Clapham) has been taken possession of, and the various organisations are now in good working order, with every promise of success. The sum of £500 has been voted to the purchase account.

A portion of the frontage of PLAISTOW Church is required for street improvements, and the trustees are expecting to dispose of

the building on advantageous terms. Plans for a new and handsome Church, to cost £4000, have been sanctioned by the Committee, and £500 promised towards the Building Fund.

MALLINSON ROAD Church has had a trying year, and feels the burden of its huge debt to be seriously crippling its usefulness.

THE CHURCHES UNDER THE DIRECT SUPERVISION of the Committee create both encouragement and anxiety.

PLUMSTEAD has had a year of energetic work, and returns a substantial increase in its membership.

WILLESDEN Church has done steady work, and is now looking hopefully to the erection of the new building. Plans have been approved by the Committee, and builders' tenders will be opened by the time this report is printed. The estimated cost will be £3250, towards which the Committee has promised £1000.

KILBURN is making real progress, the most hopeful feature of this Church being the large number of young people connected with it.

BELLENDEN ROAD has suffered heavily by the removal from the neighbourhood of some of its best workers and supporters, but is still pressing on hopefully. The great difficulty in this Church is its heavy trust debt.

CROYDON, in spite of many difficulties, holds its own, but progress cannot be expected here until better accommodation is secured.

TOOTING still gives the Committee considerable anxiety, but it is hoped that with closer working relations between the Churches in the London 11th Circuit, this Church will show considerable improvement.

SITES FOR NEW OPENINGS have been inspected during the year at Southend-on-Sea, Ilford (Seven Kings), Catford, and Highgate. The Committee have been so impressed with the possibilities of extension in some of these places that they have agreed to pay the interest for five years on the purchase money of a new site at Seven Kings, and also at Southend.

A Chapel at Hemel Hempstead was offered to the Committee

at half its original cost, but the consideration of the offer has been indefinitely postponed.

The Committee have decided that in future all money advanced in aid of New Buildings or Extensions, shall be in the form of loans, the Trustees receiving the same agreeing to pay interest at one per cent. per annum. By this alteration a new and permanent income will be secured to the Fund.

The Board of Trustees has received £5900 from the Endowment Fund of the Free Methodist College, all of which has been safely invested, deeds of the value of £19,000 being held as security. Several additional applications for loans have been received, all of which have, for various reasons, been declined.

The Committee earnestly appeal for additional subscriptions. Especially do they ask that the annual income may not suffer through extra demands made by the Twentieth Century Fund. This fund has been supported with unparalleled generosity by our people, and the Extension Fund will benefit proportionately. But if, as a result of this, the annual income falls off, the work of the Committee will be crippled. The increased opportunities of usefulness created by the Twentieth Century Fund will necessitate an increase rather than a decrease, in the annual income. To enable the Committee to grapple more resolutely with the great task that lies before them, and to meet the obligations imposed upon them by the pressing needs of the ever-growing city of London, they ought to have an income of at least £1000 per year.

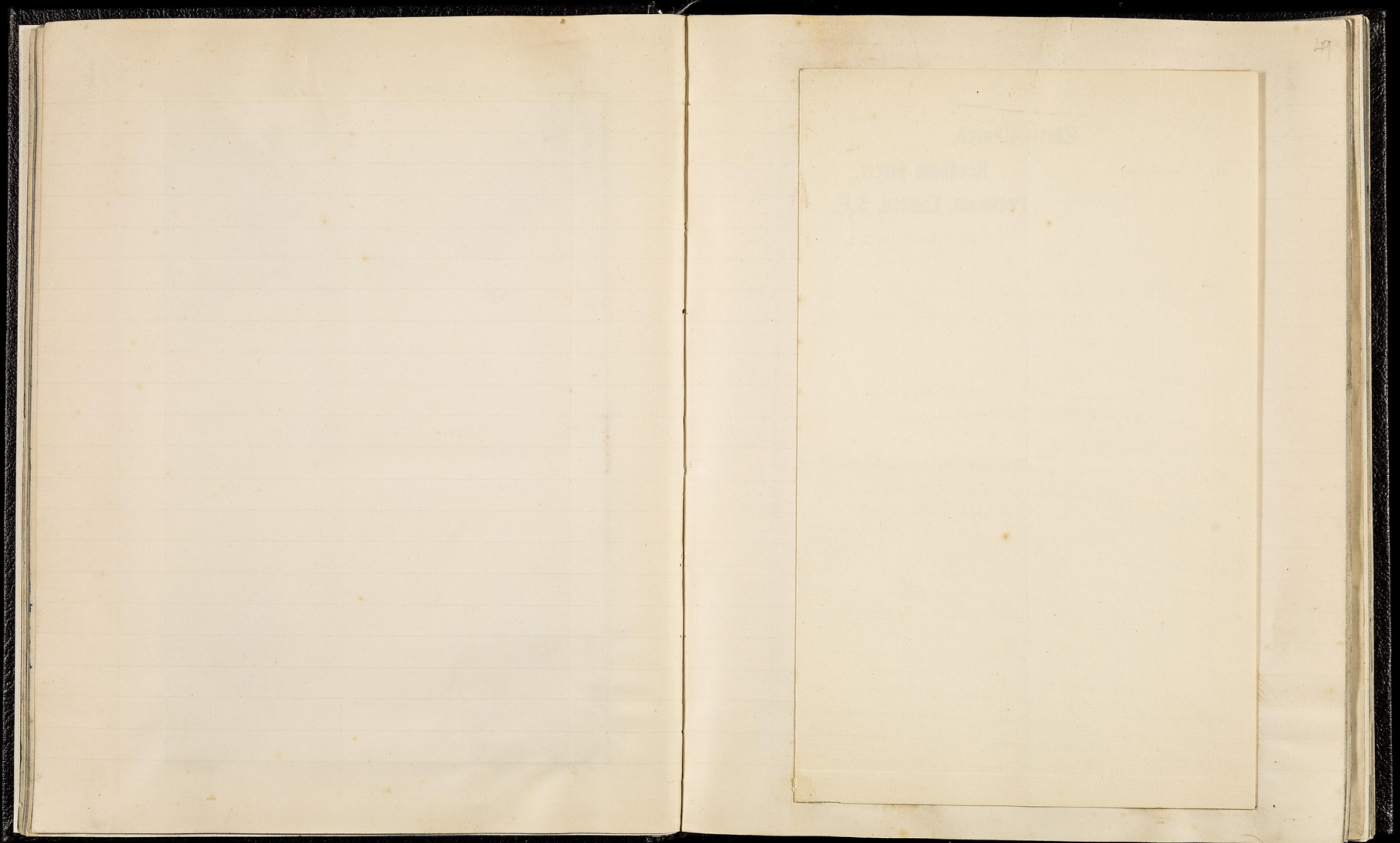

Head-quarters and Mission Settlement, at Christ Church,
Reedham Street, S.E.—On Christian Union and Unsectarian
lines, not uniformity, but to promote Christian toleration—To
preach the simple Gospel only, and have suitable Entertainments
for the people.

Well known Halls and Mission Rooms in great London
centres have been used for many years, in connection with this
movement, at Westminster, Brixton, Camberwell, Lambeth, and
in the East-end and Holloway districts. Our aim is to advance
and open up new districts. Everything about the work is free
and open to the people, and all upon New Testament lines. The
very name of Christian Union disarms criticism and gives them
all a chance, and this is the kind of work which was the late
Lord Shaftesbury's ideal for reaching the multitudes.

We have a United Evangelistic Committee of workers
and visitors who are not responsible for the administration of the
work or the expenditure: but who give a great deal of their time
at Meetings and Entertainments and in House-to-house visitations
amongst the people.

In every district where we may have Branches we want
such United Evangelistic Committees of workers and visitors, with
local Superintendents.

Visiting means helping the very poor, encouraging and
conversing with the people, Tract distribution, and personal deal-
ing, and this is engaged in at least every evening in connection
with this Mission.

In addition to great outlays there is at present a very
pressing payment of £130 a year for Buildings for the next five
years, and in addition to other cares and responsibilities the
Minister and President has become personally responsible, and
the agreements are signed, so we must get the money; and the
1st payment is due on Sept. 29th. Dear Reader, can you help
us? if so, please send something however small and address it to
the Minister of Christ Church, Reedham Street, S.E., and it shall
be gratefully acknowledged.

We have completed five years of interesting Evangelistic
work in Christ Church and Hall, by continuous Public Services,
and the Hall has been well used for all sorts of Lectures,
Concerts, and Entertainments.

We have had two Sisters or Bible Women in residence
for a considerable time and one Evangelist in residence giving his
whole time to preaching and visiting. We have had Ministers,
Laymen, Sisters, and Evangelists, taking part in our varied
meetings from time to time, also important and successful Open-
Air Services. We have had a most successful work amongst the
Young and just lately there is a great increase under able
superintendence. They had a most enjoyable outing in the
country to Ashted Woods, at end of July.

We propose to open a Bible Institute in the Upper
Rooms of the House at the Church, in November, for Bible
Study, and the Training of Evangelists. Will kind friends send



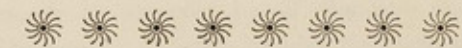

CHRISTMAS DINNER FUND.

Treasurer: Mr. R. A. MORRIS.

In 1898 we were able to record an increase of over £3 in the amount of the contributions to this Fund, but this year we regret to have to report that the donations are less by three guineas than they were in the preceding year. The money was expended in the purchase of 761 lbs. of meat which was distributed amongst 196 families, comprising 854 persons. A supply of fruit was also distributed to the Stablemen of the Star Omnibus Co. in Wren Road.

RENOVATION FUND.

This Fund was established by a resolution of the Church in December, 1897, for the purpose (1) of paying off a balance due to Messrs. Courtney and Fairbairn on the previous building account relating to the Lecture Hall, Vestries, and Waterloo Street Mission Hall; (2) Carrying out the renovation and repairs of the Chapel premises; (3) Refunding an amount of £55 15s. od. borrowed from the Chambers' Legacy Fund for Waterloo Street General Missions. We are glad to be able to report that all these objects have been attained.

In the last published Year Book it was stated that £314 10s. od. had been received, including donations to the amount of £266 4s. 3d. Since that date additional contributions have been received amounting to £133 15s. A friend also gave a special donation of £50 towards the cost of the Electric Light, and an Organ Recital, a Collection, and an Evening of Recitals by Mr. T. H. Wells, produced a further sum of £44 8s. 3d. As the work proceeded it was found that the total amount received would not be sufficient to cover the expenditure, and the sum of £204 had accordingly to be drawn from the Pew Subscription Fund. The total cost of renovating the Chapel, excluding the Electric Light, was £442 16s. 10d.

The introduction of the Electric Light has proved very satisfactory, and we are greatly indebted to Mr. Humes for the time and energy he has devoted to the supervision of this work. At the Church Meeting on October 26th, 1899, a Resolution was adopted congratulating the Renovation Fund Committee on the successful completion of their labours and most warmly thanking them and especially the Treasurer, Secretaries and Mr. Humes for their indefatigable efforts on behalf of the Church.

We give below a complete list of all the contributions to the Fund since its formation in December, 1897, and a Balance Sheet extending over the same period.

True the amount is not very large, but it is the first time the balance has been on the right side, and we hope to increase it next year. This result has been brought about by a reduction of £7 in the cost of printing, and by contributions from the Incidental Expenses Fund, the latter having been voted by the Deacons in recognition of the value of *The Messenger* as an advertisement of the Sunday Services. The circulation has been maintained at 1500 copies per month, and hearty thanks are due to the friends who have kindly undertaken the distribution from house to house. Mr. Pearce also has devoted much time and labour to superintending the distribution and to the collection of subscriptions, and we should have been glad if his efforts had been rewarded by an increase in the latter instead of our having to report a reduction. We very much regret having lost the services of Mr. T. Leonard Wells, who has been Treasurer of the Fund for three years, but are glad to report that Mr. Beecroft has kindly undertaken to fill his place.

We have also to thank Mr. Young for his valuable gift of seven volumes of "Expository Thoughts on the Four Gospels" by Bishop Kyle, presented to the School for the use of the Teachers.

THE work that is carried on at our Mission Hall at Waterloo Street is of a very varied character, as will be seen from the list of meetings on the previous page. The premises are being used for some purpose on every night in the week, and there is an earnest band of workers there who are patiently striving to brighten and ennoble the lives of the people that surround the Hall. The work is full of encouragement, but it cannot be maintained and efficiently carried on without the expenditure of money. We have to spend on the average £10 a year for structural repairs, but the income is not sufficient to meet this outlay. It has been found necessary, therefore, during the past year, to draw the sum of fifteen guineas from the Legacy Fund on p. 18. This makes a total of £40 which has been drawn from this Fund during the past five years. It is very desirable that Mr. Chambers' Legacy should be reserved to meet any exceptional demand, but it is clear that it will speedily become exhausted unless the income of the Missions Fund is made sufficient to cover the ordinary expenditure. The subscriptions have been getting less each year, and this year they are £5 less than they were in 1895. We therefore appeal very earnestly for a large addition to the list of subscribers.

THE number of Scholars is rather less than last year, but the School is still too full for comfortable teaching.

The average attendance for 1899 was—Morning, 127; Afternoon, 349; and Institute, Afternoon, 21. The average for the Scholars' Sunday Morning Service was 71. The Bible Reading Association had a membership of 72. The Magazine Agency, under the care of Mr. J. B. Goldsbrough, assisted by Mr. A. K. Croad, sold 1478 Magazines to the Teachers and Scholars.

During the year the School (independent of the Institute) has subscribed £5 1s. 5d. to the Juvenile Missionary Society, £1 15s. 6d. to the Country Holiday Homes Fund, and 11s. 5d. to the Soldiers' Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

The Girls' Sewing Class had 172 names on the register, with an average attendance of about 100 to 120; 698 garments were made by the girls during the year. The Annual Tea and Xmas Tree was held on 3rd February, and Miss Lightfoot desires to thank those who helped to the success of the evening by donations of money, articles for the Tree, or by assisting at the tea.

The Sunday School Excursion, in conjunction with Camberwell Green School, took place to Epsom Downs on 21st June, at which about 345 scholars and 37 adults from Waterloo Street were present. A most enjoyable day was spent, the weather being delightful.

THE EXCELSIOR INSTITUTE.

THE work of this portion of the Waterloo Street Branch Sunday School has been well sustained throughout the year. Although the numbers attending the Sunday meetings have not been quite so large as formerly, it is gratifying to know that there has been a quickened interest in the meetings, and a more intense desire after Christian teaching amongst some of the Members. One Member has joined the Church at Camberwell Green since our last report.

During the year the sum of £2 8s. 3d. has been contributed to the funds of the London Missionary Society, 14s. 7d. to the Country Holiday Fund, and £3 to the philanthropic work of the London Congregational Union, carried on at Medland Hall, Ratcliff Highway.

For a portion of the winter months a Debating Society has been carried on, which has been well supported by a number of the Members of the Institute. During the summer similar interest has been manifested in a Cricket Club and Rambling Club.

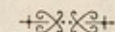

This is done by sending out approved and well qualified Ministers, and assisting in their support ; promoting itinerant labourers for the spread of the Gospel in destitute and thinly-inhabited districts, &c.

There are 222 Churches and Stations in British North America. A College is established at Montreal. In Australasia there are more than 350 Churches and Stations, for the most part self-supporting. Theological Colleges have been founded in New South Wales, Victoria and South Australia. In South Africa there are 206 Churches and preaching stations, and in Jamaica 41.

Camberwell Green Church & Congregation.

WE all know where it is written, "One generation passeth away, and another generation cometh : but the earth abideth for ever." Thus grandly speaks the Word of God, and, as years roll on, this sublime utterance is, in the experience of us all, silently and solemnly fulfilled. This beauteous world is our allotted portion for a time, we hold it by Divine charter, yet have we in it no fixity of tenure, still less any proprietary rights ! A few short years, and we yield up our holdings to the Lord of all, and quit them, never to return. Yet still this vast old globe rolls on, new footsteps tread its ancient paths, new faces come upon the scene, and the interests and pursuits, the duties and the hopes, of one generation devolve upon the next. Thus it has been, thus it shall be—change amidst stability, stability in change.

As with the world so is it with the Church. Never since man first appeared, was there a time when the Most High had not a people on the globe to bear witness for Himself. Never, while this planet lasts, will such a time arrive. Christians differ and differ widely, but the true Church in all times and places is essentially the same. Dispensations may be changed, Churches in various lands and ages vary greatly in aspect, character, and form ; yet, beneath all diversities, the identity of the one believing Church is constantly maintained. Its members are all separated to

the Lord, devoted to His praise; they testify to His righteousness and love, and, so far as in them lies, proclaim the gospel of His grace to all around. Those members come and go—the scenery of the Church, like that of the world, is passing by; but one generation of God's people takes up the work of another, and the Church eternally endures.

But our theme to-night is not the Church in general, but one Church in particular. We have to give a brief narration of the grace and providence of God in originating and preserving for one hundred years that little company of believers who now in this place find their home. It becomes us to do this, and to do it in no boastful spirit, but with hearts full of gratitude and praise; thanking God for the many tokens of His love, for the honoured men who have lived and laboured for Christ amongst us in the past, for the Christian activities and Christian workers of the present, and for the cheering hopes we cherish for the time to come. Pastors and members of other Churches are to-night with us as partakers of our joy—a joy increased by their presence and their sympathy. We bid them hearty welcome, and trust that this brief record of God's dealings with this Church may stimulate their faith and zeal no less than ours, and that the engagements of this evening may prove pleasant and profitable to us all.

ITS ORIGIN AND EARLY PASTORS.

In the year 1780 the old Mansion House of Camberwell, built by Sir Christopher Wren in the reign of Charles II., was inhabited by the Rev. Wm. Smith, M.A., a Presbyterian divine, who kept an Academy for young gentlemen. The neighbourhood was then a rural one, but spiritually dark, and the distance was great from the nearest Nonconformist Chapel. Mr. Smith accordingly, with the aid of a few Christian friends, opened the large hall of his house on

Sundays for Divine worship. This was conducted sometimes by himself and sometimes by other ministers, amongst whom was the Rev. David Bogue, afterwards of Gosport. The hall becoming inadequate for the accommodation of those who came to hear the gospel, Mr. Smith resolved, with the help of friends, to erect a meeting-house in the garden of his dwelling. Such was the origin of the Mansion House Chapel, well remembered by many who are here to-night. The place was small and inconvenient, yet is it associated, in the minds of our older friends, with many sacred and tender recollections.

Mr. Smith left Camberwell in 1799, and his pulpit was occupied by various supplies. Amongst these was the Rev. John Berry, of Warminster, who, preaching with acceptance, was in the year 1800 invited by the people to become their minister. The Congregation now formed themselves into a Church, under the title of "Protestant Dissenters of the Independent Denomination," and Mr. Berry, who was also classical tutor of the old College, Homerton, settled in their midst. Those who knew him describe him as a man of great culture, amiable character, and earnest piety. His people regarded him with esteem and reverence, but from failing health he was compelled to resign his charge in 1812.

The Congregation next sought the services of the Rev. John Boutet Innes, of Trowbridge, Wilts, who entered on his duties at Camberwell in July, 1812, the Church then consisting of eighteen members only. Mr. Innes was a genial, kind-hearted man, an author, and of considerable attainments; as a Pastor he was much respected and beloved. During his ministry eighty-nine members were added to the Church. He was also a man of influence both in the pulpit and in general society. He was, by marriage, nearly connected with Mr. Apsley Pellatt, after-

wards M.P. for Southwark, and so well known and esteemed for many years in Christian and especially in Nonconforming circles.

Our old chapel in the Mansion garden was long known as "Camberwell Meeting," no other being near. The Rev. Wm. Smith received the ground rent until 1802, when, as it would seem, his own interest in the premises expired. As other places of worship were originated, "Camberwell Meeting" received the more distinctive appellation of the "Mansion House Chapel." One of its earliest and prominent supporters, who was also most active in the formation of the Church, was Mr. Samuel Favell, a Christian gentleman, of fine and portly presence, zealous in all good works, a member of the Corporation of London, and an early and ardent advocate of civil and religious liberty. Through his efforts, a motion in favour of the repeal of the Test and Corporation Acts was annually brought forward in the Court of Common Council. His exertions largely contributed to the solution of this important question in 1828, when Lord John Russell carried successfully through Parliament an Act for the removal of the disabilities which until then had debarred all Nonconformists from holding any places of honour, trust, or profit, either under the Crown or in any municipal body in the land. Mr. Favell had in early life been associated with the illustrious Granville Sharpe, who, in 1772, procured, by strenuous efforts, that memorable decision of the twelve Judges which declared, once for all, that if a slave set his foot on British soil he became at once and irrevocably free. Hence those memorable lines of Cowper—

"Slaves cannot breathe in England; if their lungs
Receive our air, that moment they are free—
They touch our country and their fetters fall."

To the Congregation of Mansion House Chapel Mr. Innes bade farewell on the 7th March, 1824, afterwards becoming Pastor of a Church at Norwich.

THE REV. WILLIAM ORME.

He was succeeded by the Rev. William Orme, formerly of Perth, who commenced his labours at Camberwell on the 5th September of that year. Mr. Orme was a true man of God, as well as a theologian and a scholar. He was well known by his "Life of Richard Baxter," his "Memoirs of Dr. John Owen," the great Puritan divine of the days of Charles I. and the Commonwealth, and by other works of great power and repute. While Pastor of this Church, he was induced to accept the office of Secretary to the London Missionary Society, which he undertook without salary, and discharged with such ability and zeal as to command the approval and confidence of all its subscribers and friends. Few men were more influential in their day, and during his Pastorate the Church attained a position of marked distinction and usefulness. He was a man of comprehensive views; his discourses were eminently scriptural; and in them the great truths of Christ's gospel occupied the foremost place. His preaching was argumentative, yet made impressive by powerful appeals to the conscience and the heart. His multifarious engagements involved a great demand upon his time, and a strain upon his energy and strength; and after six years of arduous but successful labour, he was removed, somewhat suddenly, by death. Soon afterwards the Congregation sustained another serious loss by the death of Mr. Favell.

THE REV. JOHN BURNET.

A Church well instructed in the Scriptures by such a man as Mr. Orme, naturally sought a Pastor of solid acquirements and of sterling worth as his successor; and in July, 1830, they invited the Rev. John Burnet, of Cork, to occupy the vacant post. A happier selection could not have been made. Mr. Burnet was already well known as

a preacher of singular power, who had acquired a remarkable influence over many of the Roman Catholics of Ireland, of whose political rights he was a champion, whilst he faithfully exposed the corrupt doctrines and unscriptural assumptions of their Church. A man of commanding presence, broad and massive in his build, with a radiant and beaming countenance, in which strength and geniality of temper were remarkably combined, his gifts of speech were great, and his eloquence was telling and effective. The source of his power in the pulpit was his thorough knowledge of the Word of God, and his equally thorough and fearless proclamation of its teaching and contents. The secret of the marvellous influence he wielded over his people was found in his kindliness of heart, and in the transparent integrity and simplicity of his character. In continuous exposition of the Scriptures he remarkably excelled, and his hearers gladly followed him through the entire field of revelation. He used to meet the members of his flock in private circles for earnest free discussion on the chief topics and most exciting questions of the day, to all of which he faithfully applied the principles and precepts of the gospel.

But his influence and power for good were not confined to his own flock. He was eminently a public man, taking a prominent part in the great controversies of the times. He was an ardent social and political reformer; the fearless champion of liberty; the uncompromising foe of all oppression, tyranny, and wrong. He figured in every movement which stirred the nation to its depths. Parliamentary reform, the abolition of slavery, the repeal of the corn laws, the extension of the suffrage, the separation of Church and State, and the objects of the Peace Society—all found in him their able and undaunted advocate. On public platforms everywhere, when human rights were to be vindicated, or human wrongs denounced, the appearance

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of his stalwart form, and calm yet genial face, was the signal for irrepressible thunders of applause. His unrivalled power of argument, his keen, effective sarcasm, his quiet humour, his manly denunciation of wrong, and, withal, his imperturbable good temper, alike contributed to this. His hearers hung upon his words, and went away more than ever confirmed in the truth and justice of their cause. Public men sought the aid of his counsel. Lord John Russell used to consult him on political, and notably on Irish affairs. His decided views exposed him, of course, in certain quarters, to misrepresentation and to obloquy; but, strong in his consciousness of right, he heeded not the taunts of opponents, or the remonstrances of timid or too cautious friends. He stood unmoved, and ultimately lived down all reproach.

The Sunday-school, founded in 1811, had, in Mr. Burnet's time, largely increased, and was manned with a devoted band of teachers, who exercised over the children a powerful and wholesome influence. But the Chapel had no School accommodation; the girls were taught inside the pews, and the boys in the British Schoolroom, Leipsic-road. The Congregation, too, had long felt their need of better accommodation for themselves than their own small, cramped Chapel could afford. The termination of their lease, also, was drawing near. For these and other reasons, it was resolved to erect a new, commodious edifice on a freehold site at Camberwell Green; and the result of that resolve was the substantial, comfortable building in which now we are assembled. £8,000 were cheerfully raised for the work by the Church and Congregation, and the Pastor and people had the happiness of seeing the new Chapel and the large Schoolroom, as originally built, opened, free from debt, on the 30th of November, 1853.

As years progressed, however, Mr. Burnet was impressed with the necessity for additional school premises, and was

instrumental in erecting the Schoolroom which now bears his honoured name, the ground for which he himself generously bought and made over to Trustees, and which, after his death, was opened as a separate Schoolroom for the girls on the 11th of December, 1863.

In 1855, on the twenty-fifth anniversary of his Pastorate, the Church and Congregation presented Mr. Burnet with a purse of £500, as a tribute of their affectionate regard.

In 1860, after long and faithful service, declining years made it needful to this venerable minister to have assistance in his work, and on his invitation and that of the Church, the Rev. John Pillans, of Perth, consented to become Co-Pastor. Mr. Pillans was a man of culture, of an amiable disposition, and of studious and scholarly habits; and between him and the senior Pastor a close friendship was formed, which terminated only with the decease of the veteran minister in 1862.* Mr. Burnet's robust health had for some time been failing; his last illness, however, was but short. He died as he had lived, with calm unwavering faith in that Redeemer whom he had so long preached, speaking of himself with deep humility, but of the preciousness of Christ with confidence and joy. The day of his funeral was a day of mourning in Camberwell, such as can never be forgotten; and of him we may emphatically say, "the memory of the just is blessed."

THE REV. JOHN PILLANS

then succeeded to the Pastorate, and filled the office for eleven years. He was a man of sincere piety, and of a most kindly temperament, possessing also keen intelligence and much originality of thought. His personal character greatly endeared him to the people of his charge. He resigned the pulpit in 1873, having, at the request of the

Directors of the London Missionary Society, consented to accompany the Rev. Dr. Mullens as a deputation from that Society to the Churches in the Island of Madagascar—a mission which those brethren discharged greatly to the satisfaction of the Churches, and also of the friends and supporters of the Society at home. Since his return, Mr. Pillans has accepted the oversight of the Congregational Church at Huntley, Aberdeenshire.

THE CHURCH'S RECENT HISTORY.

After Mr. Pillans left, this Congregation remained two years without a Pastor. That period was one of much depression and anxiety, during which, however, the Church kept together, and enjoyed the pulpit ministrations (as supplies) of some of the most able ministers of its own and other denominations. This interregnum was happily terminated by the consent of the

of Castle Gate Chapel, Nottingham, in compliance with the request of the Church and Congregation here, to accept the office of their Pastor. Mr. (now Dr.) Clemance was elected on the 22nd April, 1875, and commenced his stated labours on the last Sunday in May of that year. Of him and of his work amongst us it would not become me on this occasion to discourse. Suffice it to say—and we say it with gratitude to God—that the old traditions of this Church are maintained in this respect, that the gospel of Jesus Christ is still faithfully and powerfully preached amongst us, that both the Church and Congregation have largely increased—that the Sunday-school is prospering, and that Christian work of almost every kind is in full activity in our midst. We have been enabled so to enlarge our boys' Schoolroom as to make it a spacious and attractive Lecture Hall, and have added eight rooms for separate class

teaching—an object very near our Pastor's heart. The additional ground requisite for these purposes was generously purchased and presented to the Church by our esteemed friend Mr. Whitley. On these new erections we have spent nearly £4,400, of which, at our last Annual Meeting, £600 remained unpaid, but from this debt we now are free. We began the present year with our Weekly Offering £137 below the mark, but that deficiency is now supplied. Besides a new warming apparatus, an Organ of great sweetness of tone and ample power for the Chapel has been given us by our generous friend Mr. Keen; this, it is hoped, will impart additional joyousness to our service of song. The cost of erecting it has been defrayed, as also the expense of redecorating the interior of the Chapel, amounting to £175. A sum of £150, invested, was temporarily used to close the Treasurer's accounts; but guarantees for repayment of the whole amount have already been received. Our Roll of Church members (203 when Dr. Clemance came) now numbers 410. We have thus of late received many blessings—many tokens that the God who has been with this Church in the past is with it still. Its story is a simple one—marked by no startling or extraordinary facts, yet tending to confirm our faith in Him, Who, when about to rise to heaven, and to leave His disciples upon earth, said unto them, “Lo! I am with you always.” The “Real Presence” of Christ with His Church is undoubtedly a gospel doctrine, and no less a well-established and exhilarating fact. That Presence is not, indeed, corporeal, as Romanists and Anglicans pretend; it is something infinitely better! Christ Himself told His disciples, “It was expedient for them He should go away.” His work for them on earth accomplished, He had higher work to do for them above. “I go to prepare a place for you.” Meanwhile, they had work here to do for Him, which would be promoted, not hindered, by His absence

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from them in the flesh. That outward absence was to be amply compensated by His never-ending presence in their hearts, a presence which is the source and secret of the Church's power. The history of individual Churches, no less than of the Church regarded as a whole, confirms this truth abundantly. Even so humble a fellowship as ours thus has its part amongst the “long cloud of witnesses” to the Redeemer's faithfulness and grace.

CONCLUSION.

It is no small blessing that this little company of believers in Camberwell has had Pastors after God's own heart, who have fed their souls with His Word, and not with men's tradition:—men mighty in the Scriptures, who have taught their people not only to trust gospel promises, but to apply gospel principles to all their obligations in the world. Hence has this Church been privileged not only to “contend earnestly for the faith once delivered to the saints,” but to stand also in the forefront of those who have done battle for the right in all things, and aimed, not only to subdue the sins, but to alleviate the sorrows of suffering humanity! Let us, then, thank God and take courage. Let us aim to make this Church, as a “witness for the truth,” more successful in the future than it ever has been in the past. We have many privileges, and our responsibility is proportionately great. We have many shortcomings to lament, many sins to confess, many failures to deplore. But let us press forward, forgetting the things that are behind. Let us strengthen the hands of our Pastor and of the Christian workers in our midst by diligent and fervent prayer. Let every member feel that he has his own part to fulfil in advancing the glorious ends for which alone Christ's Church continues to exist. Thus may our fellowship become a centre of Christ-like influence to this great and growing neighbourhood, and be unto it as a “city set

"Giving diligence to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace." Eph. iv. 3.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,

The pages of this Manual contain a record of your consecrated gifts to Jesus Christ and His service. The amount is large, and represents, I believe, your loving desire to help forward the work of the Kingdom of God. "The Lord loveth a cheerful giver," and I feel assured that some of that love will brighten and cheer your own lives.

Some of the amounts are for special objects. Last year you generously helped me in erecting the New Chapel at Ilford. This year again, at the opening services, you encouraged me with your gifts. It will be a source of pleasure to all our friends to know that already a Church has been formed with nearly one hundred members, and that the work of the Church is progressing favourably. Our united prayer is that Pastor and people may enjoy the rich and abounding grace of the Saviour in all their future life and service.

Another large gift has been made to the Twentieth Century Fund. As this is by far the greatest and most wide-reaching undertaking in which our denomination has ever been engaged, we are very anxious that it should be eminently successful.

I shall long remember the evening spent in the Church Parlour, where I waited for the gifts of our members and friends. It was an inspiration and gladness to me to find how readily and nobly many of our friends responded to the appeal. The richer members came with their larger gifts, and some of the poor of the flock came with their offerings—equally precious in the sight of our Divine Lord; and all came so heartily and with such an evident desire to share in this noble enterprise, that my heart overflowed with gratitude to God. Apart from the munificent gift of one donor, of two thousand pounds, I have promises of about seven hundred and fifty pounds, of which sum I have already handed to the Treasurer four hundred and forty pounds. My heart's desire and prayer to God is that we may reach the sum of Three Thousand Pounds; and this we can do if some of our friends who have not yet contributed, will do so. We are asking not less than ten shillings per member, and there are none so poor that they cannot give that modest sum in the course of two years. If this appeal should meet the eye of any of our friends who have not yet sent me their names, I shall be glad to hear from them. This is a great enterprise and we must have our full share in it! Some of us are hoping that the spiritual results which in many ways will follow our prayers and labour and love, will be so evident and continuous, that our beloved

denomination will do a nobler work for Christ and His Kingdom than any that already so richly adorns our long and illustrious history. Now I cannot help, in my own mind, connecting your generosity with character. If you did not love you would not give. And the hearty manner in which you respond to appeals for many good works is evidence to me that at heart there is much true consecration of spirit amongst us, and for this fact I thank God sincerely. Will you allow that spirit of consecration to cover other provinces in life than that of freely giving of your means?

The Lord loves a prayerful Church as well as a generous Church. Now I should be doing both you and myself a wrong if I did not thankfully acknowledge the delight there is manifested, by many, in our gatherings for prayer. Our prayer-meetings are numerous, and the devoutness and intelligence and quiet simplicity of the meetings are charming. Perhaps I am not an impartial judge, but I often feel and say that "there are no prayer-meetings whose quiet joy and devotion so touch and refresh my heart as our own." But there are many of our friends, who cannot justly plead other engagements, who never gather with us. Many who have not, in my experience of you, shewn any sense of responsibility with regard to the "common supplications" of the Church. This dereliction of duty is a distinct loss to yourselves and to the Church, and it should not be, and would not, if you would seek to determine what is your duty as in the presence of Christ. Suffer this word of exhortation!

If any ask why I am so persistent about this matter of the united praying of the Church, my answer is: "because there is no branch of Christian life and service that is not affected by it." Where true prayer abounds all other good things abound. May the Lord Himself lay this thing upon your hearts! My desire, beloved friends, is your prosperity in your own souls, in your homes, in all the spheres of your life; and I pray that the Lord may graciously continue to bless you and your children.

Mr Pim is a sharp featured elderly man with ^{short} greyish beard. Quiet and rather reserved manner. Has been 8 yrs in East Dulwich.

His district consists of the group of streets enclosed by Goose Green, Crystal Palace Road, Whatley Road and Lordship Lane but the houses on the borders and Worlington Road he does not visit except by request. Within this area are about 400 houses and 700 'visitable' families.

The 'flats' in Whatley Road and Uberscroft Road are the poorest parts. A good many costers. Many roadmen and other resting employees; also a large number of labourers in the building trades. Many poor even in the best roads such as Shawbury, ^{Hanley} etc. A number of policemen on district.

As a rule two families in a house: in Whately Road three - e.g. one on each floor. Rents have risen - the flats in Whately road were 4/6, 8 years ago. They are now 7/6 a week.

Visits the district consecutively taking about 6 weeks to get round. Nearly every time he finds some fresh faces. Is pretty well received now but it was a job at first. People wanted to "know" my object in calling. Most difficulty with the better class of people who think themselves above the L.C.M. There were more respectable people when he came as the district is getting poorer. ~~With~~ ^{With} people of the medium class he would be put off. They say "It is very kind of you to call but ^{we} attend so and so" whether they do or no. The second family is also a difficulty ~~but~~ though if the party downstairs is friendly it is alright - she will call or you can knock. If not, some excuse is made. She knows it would not suit today. Sir, she is busy washing" &c.

The Churches do not touch the district much. The Church of England does not do much for them. At St John's they have the confessional and prayers for the dead. Mr Colburn has

has gone & they have two new curates but ⁽³⁾ he does not see much of them. Colburn was 'very high'. The Salvation Army gets some and he gets some to attend St. Swift's church (Dulwich Grove). Mr. Tydemann, the Baptist also gets a 'good few' but of course the great majority are outside.

It is very difficult to get the people to meetings. Some time ago the Vicar of St. Peter's gave Mr. P. and another missionary the use of a Hall in St. Dunstan's Road but the people would not come and finally Mr. P. told the Vicar that he did not think it was any good as the people would not come. The Vicar replied "Your experience merely bears out our own. I and my curate went there in full canonicals and we got 11 adults and 30 children".

Not a great deal of relief given. If anybody gives more than other it is the Wesleyans. The Church gives 1/- in distressed cases. A good many cases there is need. Cases of poverty in the building trade through casual work especial where the men work out of doors. Tailors also suffer. Of course if they practised thrift many would be better off. Numbers are not drunkards but extra money goes in drink.

(4)
Mr P. does what he can to help cases of distress either by bringing the cases to the notice of those who help or in any other way he can. It does not do to merely take them the gospel when they are in trouble and let the people think "If you are hard up, he ~~would~~ won't help you". Now they think "Mr Pim, he will do what he can for you", & Mr P. finds this sentiment helps him in his work.

On the whole the morality of the district is not bad. A few bad women live on the district but not many and there is no open vice.

Interview with Rev. J. H. Champion ⁴³/₅₋₂₁
Primitive Methodist Church, Crystal Palace Road.

Mr. Champion is a young man of the most pronounced "good, good" type who was obviously predestined ~~for~~ by his temperament and a wretched constitution for some minor post in the religious world. He would however be better suited to some small mission rather than the ~~more~~ more arduous leadership of a church. He has only been in the ministry for 10 months: already he has broken down and when I saw him looked wretched ill. Not that he is the head of a large organization: in common with nearly all Primitive Methodist centres the work here is on a small scale: but small as it is no doubt the two ministers controlling four ~~the~~ chapels in the circuit, what with conducting services, preaching, and visiting have

a pretty hard time. The visitation of the members of these small scattered communities in an outlying district must be a real strain: Mr C. told me that his members extend from High St. Potham to Queen's Road, ~~Harwood~~ West Harwood, a distance of about five miles: he spends nearly every afternoon in visiting, and often has to walk 12 miles.

The chapel in Crystal Palace Road is only recently built: there was previously a small iron building. It only holds about 250. It has a much congregation in the morning, and about 170 in the evening. The class membership is 70 and has been doubled in 18 months.

There is a Band of Hope with 60; two Christian Endeavour with about 30; and Sunday School of 200. A Union Temperance Association is just being started, the object of which is to train the members by educational methods to do aggressive temperance work.

Those who attend the chapel are exclaiming of the working class: none would earn over £3 a week, and the average would not be more than 25/. But most have a home to themselves.

Very little mission work is done in the district: there is a Sunday School visitor and the members of the C.E. do some visiting among the sick, distributing flowers and so on: and also I suppose the benevolent class which amounts to about £5 a year.

In the summer there is the usual Open Air Service when "the public house loafers and some of the poorer children are specially touched" (Poor gentle Mr C. himself would be as likely to 'touch' the average Public House loafer as to move a tree anywhere from its rock by the power of his preaching).

The district is well worked by other religious bodies especially the Wesleyans and the Congregationalists. The latter (Mr Ramsey) are rich and have

many people of colour who can work by the day in the homes. The Church of England (Mr Jennings) is 'high' and draws from a large district.

Of the social condition of the district Mr C. Green little: he has no time for general visitation: but he has been told of great decay, and there is ~~also~~ obviously much that is unsanitary in the streets off Crystal Palace Road: houses which were meant for single families are let in tenements with disastrous results.

There is no noticeable drunkenness in the streets of East Dulwich, but drinking is much complained of. An inquiry in the Sunday School among 50 infants under 7 elicited the fact that 20 were habitually sent to the Public House.

man of 40, white beard & bald head, wears
gold rimmed spectacles & is about 60 years
of age.

The congregation is peculiar (but not for Unitarians)
in that it is mostly composed of men. 'a good

many more men than women. All well. 2
-to do, comfortable middle class, most of them
keeping a servant. Eclectic congregation.

All City people, no tradesmen, mostly Lon-
doners. London is not the stronghold of
Unitarianism. 'Except at Wandsworth
under Tarrant & Hampstead under
Brooke Herford all Unitarian congregations
in London are bad'. The real home of the
Sect is Manchester, then Liverpool &
Birmingham. Half the people come to
Avondale Rd from a distance.
The distinct beliefs of Unitarians are the

Mr Kingsbury is a chimney sweep as
were his father and uncles before him.
They are a numerous clan and practically
all sweeps, indeed if you see a sweep's
emblems in a South London court the
chances are even that a Kingsbury is
in residence. I caught him about a
week ago at the Hall and made an ap-
pointment for today but when I called
the bird had flown, leaving a Report
of the Mission and a description of
one of their open air meetings which
appeared in the Camberwell & Peckham
Times. These are appended to this
account.

The Mission premises are reached
by a narrow passage from between two
shops facing the Rye and consist of a
low pitched hall, which has probably been
a barn or stable. These people have match-
boarded

boarded the walls and turned it into a² comfortable but rather oddly shaped hall seating about 150 people.

All the people are working class and some of them rather rough characters in the past. Their open air meeting on the corner of the Rye is certainly good so far as numbers are concerned. They carry out forms, harmonium lamp &c. & start with a seated congregation of about 50. In the meetings indoors they get a full house during the winter months, but in the summer they spend the entire evening on the Rye.

It is a small mission but interesting as a purely working class affair, in which all take some part. Kingsbury and his father have been connected with it for some years. The son is a rough homely genial fellow with a little education and a good stock of native shrewdness - thoroughly in earnest. His father & the son also I think was converted some 30 years ago during a revival conducted by Wm Carter in their² Street, 15 Blackpear R². His plan was to hold meetings for particular classes of men:

*Sweepers, cabmen, navvies, Policemen &c.³
From that time to this these men have been
devoting their evenings to Mission work in
South London.*

The Sunday Morning Meeting is very encouraging. Many of our brethren and Sisters meet for fellowship, in the Breaking of Bread, remembering our Lord's death till He comes.

The Tuesday Night Prayer Meeting is also very encouraging. Our young brethren and sisters attend very regularly, and are able to open their hearts to their Heavenly Father, who has promised to

hear and answer prayer. If any of the Lord's work is to be done well it must be by prayer.

Our Thursday Night Meeting, held in the open air through the Summer, has proved a great blessing. Mostly men are present on these occasions, and they listen to the Gospel with great interest. Thank God the Gospel has not lost its power, neither is it played out. Praise the Lord.

A. Peckham Rye "Open Air." Oct. 26. 1895 (4)

At the corner of the shrubbery on Peckham Rye, opposite Scylla Road, we noticed last Sunday evening a compact crowd of persons of all sorts and conditions. Now such a sight is not an unusual one in Peckham in the summer, but the autumn being well advanced we were somewhat curious to know what was attracting the crowd. Pausing therefore, just a moment to gratify our curiosity, we found what was going on so interesting that, like the Ancient Mariner, we could not choose but hear, and it was with something like consternation that we found presently, upon looking at the time, that we had been there two hours. Now, to speak the truth, we are somewhat surfeited with open air meetings of various kinds in Peckham, and the quality of the present one came to us as a great surprise. Long indeed is it since we stood so long listening to such speakers, and found the time pass so rapidly.

As for the audiences, numbering on an average some 400 or 500, their behaviour was exemplary, and except for an occasional yell from some belated Yahoo on the verge of the crowd, we might have been in church as far

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as decorum went. But right there, all comparison with 5
church ends. Free and unsharpened criticism of churches as
distinguished from the church one and indivisible, was
the order of the evening, and, if rugged, was certainly to
the point. One speaker especially was very scornful
about the re-union of the churches. "How can you
re-unite that which is an indivisible unit, one for all
time and eternity," queried he. But the chief attraction
of the whole affair was the utter absence of cant or whine.
The speakers were a varied lot, - we saw a sweep (who
conducted the proceedings) a wood hawker, a sawdust
dealer, a sailor, a clerk and so on, but one and all spoke
in a manly way, and without a trace of the lugubrious
and unnatural tone so repulsive, and unhappily so
common in religious open air meetings. But then the
speakers were all "down" on religion, holding it responsible
for much evil and most infidelity. They contrasted it with
Christianity much to its disadvantage, and insisted that
the term religion had got to mean anything but what was
good and desirable, and they would have none of it. Each
speaker appeared to be perfectly sincere, and to have not
only an intimate working knowledge of his subject, but
practical every day proof of its reality to him. Each
spoke of the God-man, Jesus Christ, not as some foggy
myth, stories about whom had been drilled into his
mind parrot-fashion, but as his near and dear personal
friend, one who walked and talked with him day by
day. One and all insisted upon reality. Abhorrence of
shams, and the ease with which they might be detected,
was another favourite topic. A radical change was insisted
upon, and no outward patchwork received any consideration.
Make the tree good and its fruits will be likewise, was the
cry. Utterly unconventional, yet entirely Scriptural, the

whole proceedings were strangely attractive, and we were not surprised to see several listeners furtively wipe away a tear. The knowledge of Holy Writ possessed by the speakers was another feature of the gathering, and largely accounted for the power of their oratory. For it must be remembered that most of them were men of little or no education, apart from the Bible. Up to date illustrations were largely in evidence & the daily paper was freely drawn upon to point the morals & adorn the tales.

Presently we received a shock; a collection was being taken. It was a real disappointment at first, and we would have been glad not to have waited so long. But not to appear mean, we stuck to our post and heard the explanation.

It appears that the handful of artisans who are doing this work have a large hall upon their hands, which they are unable to give up, being bound by the lease. Out of their scanty means, they contribute the bulk of the expense for rent, lighting &c. but the congregations being unwilling to search for the hall, there are no indoor meetings to collect from. So they bring their message outdoors, and feel quite justified in asking help from any sympathizers who may be standing round. After that we were glad to see that they did not ask in vain, and still more pleased were we to receive a balance sheet of the whole concern.

Hence debate has long raged over the merits of open air propaganda, but after Sunday's experience, we are perfectly satisfied that at the "pitch" at least in Peckham, a vast amount of good is being done in an unpretentious way, without any annoyance to non-sympathizers, and at the minimum of cost.
