
Called upon Supt. Wakeford at the Chief Office Blackheath Road. He is a man of about 50; keen and alert; a total abstainer. Received me very courteously, and after I had explained our purpose and obtained the promise of an interview at the close of the work, I was introduced to the local inspector, Insp^t. S. Gunnier.

The R. Division is very large, extending from Old Kent Road (the Canal Bridge, by Deptford to Greenwich, Woolwich & and going south by Lewisham & Lee to Eltham.

The Blackheath, ^{Road} Sub-division (on which is taken first) is very populous and includes parts of Deptford, Greenwich & Lewisham. The boundary runs from the Royal Victoria Dock, along Windmill Lane & then via the Surrey Canal to the Canal Bridge Old Kent Road. South along Old Kent Road, New Cross Road & Lewisham High Road to Lewisham Junction, thence past to the top of Elliot Hill, across Blackheath to Chesterfield Walk & by Crookes Hill & King William Street to the Thames. The Deptford district (Station on Princess St) includes the part enclosed by Deptford Creek, Broadway, New Cross Road, Old Kent Road & the Canal.

Walk with Inspector Gummer and Sergeant Goddard over district bounded by Deptford Creek, & Broadway, High Street, Creek Road & the Stowage, including parts of the parishes of St. Paul, St. Nicholas and St. Paul. Christchurch.

Inspector Gummer is a smart well dressed portly man. Jacket suit & straw hat. Has over 10 years service at Blackheath Road & knows the district well. We started about 10 am, Sergeant Goddard having instruction to release the Inspector at noon as he was due at Woolwich Police Court.

Started at Deptford Bridge, where Deptford Creek passing under becomes the Ravensbourne. North side shops (3 storied). Gardner's large establishment draper, clothers & general stores. Modern building with clock tower above ^{Upper floors used as Liberal Club.} Red as map.

Deptford & Broadway. Triangular open space, paved with cobble stones. Stand for barrows, and the meeting place of the neighbourhood. Political & other meetings held here. Men standing about. Good three storied shops to High Street, slightly poorer near Church Street. Red as map.

Church St S of Reginald Road - purple

Leonidas Street S side - lb

N up Church Street (to Reginald Rd). Poor class of shops near the Broadway
3 storied & old fashioned private houses; a few let in tenements
but most look comfortable. Poorer as you go north. Pink

N along Adder Street. Small 2 st. houses like Hosier St. south of the passage into Hosier Street. L. B., in character. Between the entry into Hosier Street & Leonidas Street is a row of old houses on E. side. 4 rooms & attic in roof. Footway leading to houses is about 2 ft below level of roadway & is protected by iron railing. Some prostitutes & criminals. Low rough class: reckons this the worst part of Deptford. Went into a house here to arrest a man at 5 am. Found father, mother & 5 children in one room. All rooms are small. This piece should be D. Blue lined. Houses opposite are 2 st. D. Blue in character. Northern part is 2 st & Light Blue except 3 shops & publichouse north of Leonidas Street. All comfortable. Pink. W. into North Street 3 two storied cottages. Windows clean. Good white clothing drying in yard. Purple to L. B. Light Blue on map.

S. along Church Street (Railway to Creek Street). On the west side by the railway is a passage leading to High Street. Ground on south side is taken for Builders Yard (Holloway's); one house occupied by foreman. Two & three storied houses; a few shops; opposite Gaffer Street & south of that point, people are poor. Barefoot girl came out of one house. Group of women talking in doorway near Hall Street

Street. Men sitting on pavement outside publichouse with feet stretched across footway. Pony cart standing in road - chalked for sale. Few shops are comfortable. German baker etc. Purple as map for whole, but portion south of Giffen Street might be N.B.. South of the Addis school, houses are pulled down & ground let. W. along Giffen Street. 3 storied, about 6 rooms. Many of the houses at the east end are delapidated & boarded up. Slatternly women standing about; some shoeless children. Low class, some prostitutes, hawkers etc. Some houses let in furnished rooms. Street roadway has been made up - covered with tar paving & chingle. big like sheets in Notting Dale. Not many charges; has improved in that respect. Dr Blue, with Black line as map. S along Berwick Street. Deptford Ragged school - a large square block at W. corner of Giffen Street. ~~A~~ Three 3-st houses on east side - big like Giffen St. Dark blue E along Regent Street. Two storied houses - broken windows. Some street sellers. Two women talking in roadway as we entered. 'Well known prostitutes' said the Inspector. The women moved off quickly, evidently recognising him. Board School extended to W. Dark Blue as map. S and W along Hale Street. Narrow crowded street. 2 st. houses. Broken windows, sills broken away. ~~Shut~~ Shut doors open into room.

Beds seen through ground floor windows. When visiting with Inspector in morning the women were standing about the doors, criticizing their visitors. At an afternoon visit I found them sitting in groups on the footpath, one on a chair, more on the edge of the cob curbstones whilst one woman completed a small circle by sitting in the road with her feet toward the kerb. Costers driving home on their pony carts. Candle factory at west end of street, emitting very evil smells. Not much crime. ~~Dark Blue rather than~~
N into Stanhope Street. 2st houses, flush with pavement. Broken windows; cemented roadway blocked with barrows. Two men breaking up some gas fittings & putting the metal in a sack. A few Italians; some costers & prostitutes; shoeless children running about & frowsy women gaping at the doors. Board School takes greater part of north side. The west end of the north side is more open & the people a little cleaner, approximating to L. 13. ~~Dark blue~~
 lined black as map.

S along Church St. to Reginald Road 2 + 2½ st. houses. A few are modern, near on S. side near Church Street. Some houses covered with creepers; clean curtains. Nice little houses - only a few on south side near Reginald Place look poor. Two contractors; remanded comp. working people. Mission church on north side. G. F. S. home on south. ~~Pink~~ rather than purple of map. Has improved

High Street, Deptford

S. into Reginald Place. Broad street 2st houses flush with pavement; quiet working class: paperhanger; people in regular work. 2 families as a rule. Nearly as good as the Road. Pink to Purple. Purple on map. At the end is Amelia Terrace. Row of old cottages (2st) with flower gardens in front. ~~over~~ On front of centre house is a full sized figure of a sailor holding a Union Jack. Pink to Purple Purple on map. N. along Reginald Street. 2nd 6 rms. Exactly like Reginald Place. Pink to Purple. Purple on map. W. to High Street. Wide market street. 2 + 3 storied houses, almost as many styles of building as houses, the only agreement being that all have shop fronts, sometimes a part of the original building but more often an addition thereto. Near the Railway Station, the Public Hall is being converted; two shops being improvised, one on each side of the pillars supporting the porch. Most of the shopkeepers live over their shops. Best shops are nearest the Broadway; decline in character being gradual to Railway arch. Red as map to archway. North of Railway arch to Evelyn Street, the shops are 3 storied. Trade is less brisk, and shops not so good, ~~except~~ on the east side. Some assistants living over drapers. Red as map.

At this point Sergeant Goddard relieved the Inspector. He is a thin man of about 40. Face mottled, the result of bad digestion or too close application to the worship of Bacchus. Walks slightly lame, owing to rheumatism. Has been over 10 years in this sub-district but for last 18 months at Blackheath Road.

From the corner of High Street, a new road has been cut through to Creek Road, continuous with Evelyn Street, involving the demolition of a great part of Wellington Street & Queen Street. It is named Creek Road. Land is cleared & L.C.C. advertise it 'to let' except, a plot at near east end where a new Deptford Fund House is being erected.

Queen Street. Few cottages at east end, standing back, are closed - boarded up. 2 st houses, poor looking white curtains; broken windows; few flowers here & there. narrow street.

On north side, at east end is Rectory Bldgs. Three blocks of tenements 5 floors. Belong to Industrial Building Co. Labourers, but don't look poor. Rough; better than the street. All the tenements are full & place is better than 10 years ago when many were empty, ^{including} one block being empty. Purple to L.B. L.B. on map.

North on west side of Church Street is Alfred Place. 5 two-storied houses with small gardens in front, ~~face~~ filled with broken boxes & other rubbish. Costers. Two families. L.B. as map. Archway on north side leads to Copperas Square, three 3 storied houses on west & $\frac{3}{2}$ two storied on east side. Cemented yards in front with much litter. Dirty & ragged children. A murder here some months ago. Dark Blue. Not marked on coloured map.

Part of Alvar Street east of Creek Street is cleaner than west part - but still L.B. Costers etc. entrance to Asphalte works at end of street. North to Bernmore Street } These form a block of small Harrow Place & } 2 st. cottages together with the Knott Dugdell Street Sheet

Street frontage. Sheets are narrow. Harnar Place faces wall of work on the Creek bank. Costers & sheet sellers, a few Italians. Dugald Street has houses on south side only.

Bronze Street (late Copperas Street). South side is old dilapidated houses, windows broken, others closely curtained, low labouring class. On north side houses are more modern. 2 st with gardens in front near middle of street. ^{House} East very neglected; & dead wood & brickwood damaged at east end. Signs of great & continued neglect. At west end of north side is a pottery (red). Children amusing themselves by throwing pellets of clay at each other. L.B. on west & D.B. on east side. D.B. on map E along Creek Road. N. side 2½ st. gardens in front. 2 st. on south side. A narrow court yard reached through archway. 2 small cottages; some broken windows. D13.: not marked on map. S. into Cross Street. 3 2st houses on west side. Purple. Pink on map. W. into The Orchard. Irregular open space with 2st. cottages on three sides. Labouring people. L13. except at east end where houses are painted & better kept. Purple

General Remarks. This walk includes the greater part of poor Deptford. Both officers agree that it is better than it was; not so much crime or violence. To me, little or no improvement is apparent in the poor streets and I am have grave doubts as to the knowledge of the police of the social condition of the people. They measure the streets mainly by the proportion of offences against the law and diminution of these

These is an improvement which they attribute to improved social position.

The Irish streets - the block between the Rly and Hales Street appear little different to 10 years ago; possibly more congested, except Giffen Street where so many houses are closed. East of Church Street the houses belong to the Adderley Charity. All are small and poor; Adderley Street being distinctly poorer than formerly. The Adderley Charity has a school in Church Street & is now building a large red brick building in New Cross Road, which will take its place.

North of the Railway, the streets appear poorer & more neglected. Rectory Bldgs and Mary Ann Bldgs are better than they were, but against these must be set Crossfield Lane (distinctly poor).

Most of the people living here work at one of the factories along the creek. Beside the Chemical works, there are a numerous business places employing a large number of 'hands'. The Parish Yard, the Day wharf, and the Asphaltic works employ many hands and numbers also work at Penns & Humphreys & the riverbank.

The Steam Navigation Co. has a large yard in the stowage.
All these works are busy and work is plentiful
so that no man need be unemployed.

An Italian colony is growing up near near
Knott Street, ice cream vendors & asphalt workers;
some have also settled down in Stanhope Street.





Large music hall at corner of Watson Street - Empire Theatre of Varieties - just completed. To be opened on July 31st. Red as map N along Amersham Vale 3½ st. private houses; well kept - 2 families + occasional lodger. Some railway men. Pink as map E into Douglas Street. Wide airy street. Glasville Grove. At entrance of Grove are two blocks of cottages^(2nd) at right angles to roadway. Eight in each block - 4 back to back - gardens between the blocks. Except the front four, all are poor. LVB. only partially marked on map. Further down are some small four roomed cottages. Clean white blinds; quiet street. Purple rather than light blue of map. To East side is taken by Clark, Burnett & Co's engineering works. Over 100 men employed. Glass work on other side. Back to

Baldon Street. On north side at entrance are 3 st. houses; doors open; short blinds, rough women. DVB. to LVB. Not marked on map. Opposite these are two old wooden cottages & a third looking like a converted stable. Not so bad as opposite side. LVB. Not on map.

Baldon Street itself is 3 st. on west side, about 7 rooms; two large registered lodging houses. On east side 2 st. 5 rooms. Some have had small forecourts in front but palisade has gone & the path is so much wider. Costers barrows and knife grinders wheels & ice cream barrows standing in street. Women, gromsy and half dressed, eye you curiously as you pass; one asked the sergeant whether he had come for her "this time". Children, some shoeless, all dirty and ragged, playing in street. A few men getting ready to go out with their stock. Windows and doors open. Nicknamed Tug-of-War Street, because so many fights take place here. "Better than it was" says the sergeant; "fewer cases come from here". Used to have to send 20 men to

make

make arrests. He would hardly call it criminal now. To me the street looks worse than it did 10 years ago; while if any men & women have the criminal brand on their faces, these seen on my two ~~for~~ visits unmistakably bear it.

Dark Blue with Black line as map.

E through narrow passage into Charles Street. A ~~bar~~ publichouse at the corner is being rebuilt - a huge 3-storied building. The new music hall backs on the passage & the enlargement must be to catch its patrons. "A failure at present," say the sergeant: "has not taken enough to pay its rates." "He hasn't got a badge on" cries one boy; & all stop and reconnoitre the enemy for a moment or two & then continue their retreat when the badge is identified. Policeman continues his beat, amidst the smiles of the mothers of these or some of the other children playing in the street, who ~~has~~ saw the incident. Poorer than other streets.


Remarks on District

General Remarks. This neighbourhood contrasts sharply with that to the east of High Street. With exception of ~~the~~ Baillie Street and the streets between it and High Street the poor patches are small and stand in marked contrast to their surroundings. Napier Street is the only place west of this group that can be termed poor.

The ~~streets~~ are well kept; nearly all are regularly laid out, the houses having a small garden or forecourt. All have some garden at the back and many have quite a long piece of ground, so that plenty of light and air is secured in back & front.

The people seldom move and there is an air of comfort about the homes; the bulk of the people evidently have incomes sufficient to obtain not only the necessities but many of the luxuries of life. Near New Cross the proportion of railway men is large and these men are constantly to be seen in the streets

Railway Comp't & called Folkestone Gardens. 3 floors with drying ground on the roof. Wide asphalted yard between each the blocks. 231 tenements. Well built; venetian blinds, walls coloured; gas laid on, penny in slot. Two southern & largest blocks are full & third was filling. When I went the second time, a few families were in the fourth block. All will be full soon. Sergeant Vanstone says they had some people known to the police at first & they feared the dwelling would become 'warm'. These have gone & the place looks decent. Pink to purple. Not on map. S to Knyle Street. 2 st. houses, bay windows. Built for two families with separate entrance to yard from first floor. Shut built both side to church. Railway has taken land beyond.

E. along New Cross Road. The north side of the road between the two railway stations is shops or private houses converted into shops. 3 floors. And seem prosperous. Red as map.


General Remarks. Wedged between the two railway the railway influence is very strong here. The district has improved considerably within the past 10 years, notably the streets at the north, which were then occupied by inferior tenants, many were empty. The increasing demand for houses has caused the elimination of the more undesirable people. ~~East Head~~ of Woodpecker Road the roads are wide and houses have large gardens. Houses are all of the 6 roomed type; the older, south of Desmond Street not being without the bay windows that characterize the more modern houses on this estate. West of the Woodpecker Road, the gardens are smaller and the houses more diversified. The large amount of open ground by the railway in some way compensates for the smaller gardens and here as on the

on the other side of the Wood pecker Road, the air
is fresh & pure and the dwellings receive plenty
of light.

Sergeant Vanstone has a good knowledge
of the district. He lives in Deptford & has been
stationed here over 9 years and
remembers the district for about 14 years.

General Remarks

This district comprises the Hatcham Park Estate. Wide streets, long gardens, well kept houses and a general appearance of comfort & respectability characterize the place. Railway men, clerks & others in regular employ ~~mostly~~ live here. The women are well dressed. The doorsteps are kept clean & though the number of children must be great they do not play about the streets. Only two publichouses are found on the estate - in Monson Road & Camphill Street - but



There are four grocer's licences & several pubs. in the main road.

It is essentially the home of the well-to-do, better class working man; and many probably hold the leases of their houses. Some houses have two families and when this is not the case, the family is large or a gentleman lodger is taken.

Like the adjoining districts, this has improved if anything; no houses are to let nor do they come into the market.

Coming westward from Deptford, the status of the people appears to rise as you go; culminating in this estate. The houses on the behind the west side of New Cross Road being poorer again.

Walk with Selective Sergeant Vanstone over District bounded on the north by the Surrey Canal, east by the L.B. & S.C. Rly. and ~~the~~ a portion of the parish boundary & south west by the Old Kent Road, being parts of the parishes of All Saints, Hatcham, and Christ Church, Old Kent Road.

Starting from Old Kent Road station, up white Post Lane. East side is the wall of the Fever Hospital. The lane leads to Tomlinson & Sons (box makers). Shops to Devonshire Grove; private houses to Sylvan Grove, then shops & private houses of a rather inferior class to the Rly Station. A few poor lodgers in some of the houses but in all cases the householders are comfortable & often very well to do. Pink barred to Red. Red on map

General Remarks. This district is largely dominated


by the Gas works and from almost every point the huge gasometer (the second largest in London) is visible, whilst the workmen are found in every street. Near Canterbury Road the works on the Canal become more important to the people as centres of employment, whilst the proximity of South Bermondsey & Old Kent Road Stations has induced large numbers of warehousemen, post office employees & others engaged in the City to settle here and use the cheap workmen's trains. As a whole the district has deteriorated, chiefly by the removal of the better class workers so that the pink streets tend to purple & purple to light blue.

Sergeant Vanstone is a fresh coloured young man, a native of Deptford and far away the best officer I have met so far as local knowledge is concerned. In nearly every street ~~he~~ knew personally some of the people, the only instance he was in ~~ft~~ fault was County Grove.

Walks with Sergeant Vandstone over district bounded on N.W. by Windmill Lane and the Surrey Canal; S.W. by the S.E. Railway; south by Edward Street & part of Creek Road; east by Deptford Green and N.E. by the River Thames, being parts of the parishes of St Nicholas, St Luke, St Mark and St Paul, Deptford.

Starting at the corner of Wootton Road & Clyde Street, N up Wootton Road. 2½ st. 7 rooms, a few 6 two-story houses. Windows well curtained, flowers here & there, street clean. Men employed at the Victualling yard, Woolwich Arsenal & meat market. All comfortable pink as map.

N and W to Grove Street (to Barnes Terrace) Old 2 & 3 st. houses, red tiled roofs; coal porters & men in docks. All look comfortable. Board school takes part near Barnes Terrace. West side; modern 2 st. 6 rms. Two families. Pink rather than purple of map. Take off part of colour on east side.



Rough women; one with head bandaged; others with black eyes; one old harridan sitting on doorstep with a dirty clay pipe. shirtless children. Costers, street sellers, gutcleaners. "Wherever there is beer there they are & the more the better" was the sergeant summing up of these people. Some of the houses have been good family residences: one now occupied as a tenement house has a fine carved overhanging porch with a fat cherub carved in full relief supporting the pediment on either side.

General Notes. The district covered in these two walks may be roughly divided into two parts by Evelyn Street, differing in style of buildings and character of inhabitants. On the riverside is old Deptford with its red tiled, small-windowed houses, which in their decadence, retain much of their quaint picturesque appearance. Deptford Green to Keston does not bear New King Street is the representative of the style which predominates. New King Street, altho the L. C. C. buildings in the centre show that the old order is passing away. In these area the riverside and cattle market workers form the bulk of the population. A careless, hand to mouth class of people. One characteristic of this area is the large number of fully licenced houses

houses: some are large gin palaces but even the little places that in most districts would have been beer houses have the full licence. The Cattle Market works on the river bank explain this peculiarity but in any case the district has too many licenced houses.

South of Evelyn Road is a comfortable neighbourhood. Regular modern streets, wide and airy, occupied by comfortable working people. Very few signs of poverty but many of comfort. The district compares favourably with the streets off Woodpecker Road.


Throughout the district a distinct improvement is noticeable. South of Evelyn Street, the light blue element has been practically eliminated, changing purple to pink. A similar tendency is observable in the streets off Grove Street; houses were easily obtainable here in former years: now the demand is greater than the supply and landlords are weeding out the undesirable tenants. In all the district east of New King Street the change is working thro' demolitions, the newer buildings being occupied by a (outwardly at least) better class.

A great change has come over the people: instead of

of spending so much in the publichouses, they go for excursions of all kinds & to this change Sergeant Vanstone attributes the improvement.

The value of house property has increased enormously. An old man, who formerly lived at the corner of Grove Street & Windmill Lane, bought a house there for £400 some years ago & sold it to the Railway Company for £105. He has recently sold the 400 years lease of a house there for £300. ground rent 50/-.

General Remarks. Roughly the S.E. Railway divides this district into two parts. The western differs entirely from the portion of Deptford on the north. The ground is much higher, overlooks the north; the air is fresher: always a breeze. The people are comfortable & not crowded. East of the railway the land sinks to the Ravensbourne. In the southern portion the people are tending to a pink level - pink barred streets changing to pink and the purple to the same colour. Between Greenwich Street & Tanner's Hill the improvement due to re building is immense. Old cottages have been displaced by comfortable working class dwellings.

dwellings. Excepting a few houses near Mill Lane the only poor part is the area between Tanners Hill and Florence Road, and this compared to the poor slacks north of the Broadway is quite comfortable.

Personal Note

Sergeant Vagg is a solid, stolid officer. Has been 10 years on the district & should know something about it but I found it difficult to get much from him beyond the obvious, save in a few places such as Mill Lane, where he would come in direct contact with the people. Walks a little lame

Notes on District

General Remarks. This walk includes the greater part of what is known as Old Greenwich. It is unlike any other part of London. The only ~~place~~ place with which I can compare it is a patch of Old Wandsworth near the River Wandle & The Gravel Ground at Peckham but neither of these are so large or distinct from their surroundings. Shut off by the Railway & the Creek & with only

direct approach from the London side the district retains the characteristics of a country town with ~~the~~ few leading streets and little alleys & closes tucked away in between. It consists of three chief streets - Bridge, Thames & Roan - with little cul-de-sacs & winding alleys branching off at every 30 or 40 yards.

The houses are nearly all old - mostly dating from the early years of the century whilst some undoubtedly go back to the 18th century. As a rule the houses in the main streets have long back gardens & passing down one of the courts, one sees a scarlet beans, sunflowers &c & wonders whether Charing Cross can be within 7 miles.

Like country town cottages, the smaller houses are set down anywhere behind back to back - without any through ventilation. Drainage & sanitary accommodation bad. This however has & apparently is being remedied: here & there at the entrance of the courts, one notices a comparatively new chamber


covered with its iron plate indicating that the drains have been modernized.

The inhabitants are with exception of a few shop keepers, working people; coalies, gas stokers, lightermen, bargemen, waterside and other labourers largely predominating. As in Deptford the character of the people has improved. The people are not so rough or at all events do not trouble the police so much as formerly. Here as in Deptford the demand for house room has enabled the landlords to get rid of the undesirable tenants and install the working men. Or can it be that the one time rough has, by dint of the increasing pressure upon him, been compelled to settle down as a working man?

The houses are mostly old but well cared for. ~~and the best~~


The best part of the district is the high ground ~~better~~ between Croom's Hill and Blackheath Hill. It is a nice open ~~desert~~ neighbourhood: a good breeze is obtainable, even when the lower sheets are quite calm, whilst from many points, fine views of the lower land to the north are obtainable.

Originally a good middle class district the social decay has affected this part, and the working class are gradually gaining possession of the better houses. The end of Hyde Vale near King George Street is an example of this, whilst at the upper end ~~now~~ boarding houses are now superseding the older families.

This walk completes the whole of the Blackheath Road Police Sub division except a small portion in Lewisham, which is described in Book

G.F.A.

Walk with Detective Sergeant Hardy over district bounded by Greenwich Hospital on the west, The Thames on the N.W., Trafalgar Road on the S.E.; Pelton Road & Bellot Street on the east & a line to the Thames on the north, being parts of the parishes of St Alphage and Christchurch. 
