N from Trafalgar Road up Whitworth Street. 4 rooms houses. Mostly kept by one family. Men work at Telegraph works & factories. Better than Northumberland Street.
Purple to pink.


Pelton Road facing Whitworth Street is Lambton Terrace 3 storied houses - 2 families. All comfortable Pink. On south side to Columb Street are small 2 st. houses. Purple as map. S. along Columb Street. 2 st houses like Whitworth Street Purple to pink. Purple on map.

This completed the day's walk.

General Remarks. The area covered includes the greater part of old East Greenwich. West of Marlborough the streets are narrow, the houses old and most of the people distinctly poor. East of Marlborough It is a mixture of old and modern houses; the streets are more regular and most of the houses have a patch of garden

East Greenwich N of Trafalgar Road.

and some have a ~~long~~ ^{long} strip. The bulk of the people are dependant upon the River or the many factories fringing the East Greenwich peninsula. A considerable number of tram men are also residents here, the Woolwich and the L.C.C. tramway systems having their termini near Christ Church.

Walk with Detective Sergeant Hardy over district bounded by the River Thames, Marsh Lane, Blackwall Lane, part of Pelton Road & Bellot Street, being part of the parish of Christ Church, E. Greenwich.

Starting from the corner of Blackwall Lane & Pelton Road (yellowed on map) - west up Pelton Road. A few 4 or 5 roomed houses on each side. One family as a rule - men employed at cable works. Look comfortable. R. C. Church & Presbytery on east side.

Pink to purple.

Along Commerell St (yellowed on map). 2st. 6 rooms. Look decent now (10 am). Old women beating mats & cleaning steps. Last night the people were in the street & it looked as Hardy says it is - rough. Two families as a rule. Men at Gasworks or cable works. A few shops near Blackwall Lane. Purple. Not coloured on map.

Conley Street. Houses & people similar to Commerell St; slightly poorer at north end - windows broken & pattered. Purple to Lt 3. Purple on map N into Blackwall (late March) Lane. West side has been cleared to Commerell St - was v. poor. East side to

To this point is small 4 roomed cottages. Coalts, carmen, & labouring people. LB. A few houses are DB as map makes all. North of this the houses are newer. As far Davern St. 2 st. shops. Gums. Most are kept by women; the husband going to work. Pink. North of Davern St. 2 st. 6 roomed houses. Poor working class - little white blinds - Rather rough. LB to purple. North of this is a small iron hall used by the salvation army & a 3 storeyed block of buildings belonging to the L.C.C. called West view cottages. The ends of the block are tenement dwellings with cottages between containing 4 rooms and an attic & letting for 7/6 a week. All comfortable working people. Pink. not on map. These cottages are really pretty and well built - a refreshing contrast to the jury built rubbish almost adjoining them.

Azof Street. On the north side is Rothbury Hall, a very pretty Congregational Mission Church - red brick with pinnacles. South side is 2 storeyed houses with bay windows. 2 families. Windows are well kept & steel doors ^{shut} _{shut}. Houses on north side have a narrower frontage & bay to ground floor window only. 2 or 3 families as a rule. A stout rough looking woman


woman was sweeping her doorstep. Until she came here a short time ago (said Hardy) she had lived in a tent. The family gained a living by collecting tin cans from the rubbish shoots & burning them to obtain the solder, which they sold. North side £13

to £13. South side Purple. The street is being extended westward the new houses being like those on the southside. They are advertised to let in floors. Ground floor 7/6 & first floor 8/6 (3 rooms & scullery). Roadway & footwalks are not made up - the centre is a sea of mud 6 to 7 inches deep. What it is like in wet weather is difficult to imagine. N into

Christchurch Street. A few 2st houses on west side belonging to a large builder who has a yard there. Look comfortable. Pink. At the N end of this street is the entrance to the Telegraph Construction & Maintenance Company's Works.

E into Mauritius ~~Street~~ Road. This road is not made up but is in rather better condition than Agof. A footway has been made on the north side 2st. 6 roomed houses - small forecourt on N side. Men working at Mandley's ~~the~~ Telegraph works. Mixed. 2 families - Purple with strong tendency to £13. on south side.

North along Blackwall Lane, now the main road to the Blackwall Tunnel. Market gardens on both sides, while on the west ~~are~~ by the river are seen the ~~the~~ shafts of the factories on the bank. No dwellings until near Morden Wharf Road when a group of 50 houses belonging to the L.C.C. is reached - Idenden Cottages. Two storeyed & attic in roof; built on three sides of an open space. Look comfortable - men employed at wood wood paving works &c - earn about 30/- P.M. Morden Wharf Road is now called Sea Witch Lane. On the south is Warwick Place. Six tenement cottages with little gardens in front. Poor - probably cement workers. Two old houses on east side are closed. Lt B.

N. of the Lane is Sidmouth Place. Nine 2 st houses - gardens in front - better than W. Place. Purple. Along the narrow Sea Witch Lane thro' clouds of dust which obscure the view 50 yards ahead, and ~~the~~ most unpleasant fumes, turning sharply to left & passing under a network of pipes, one is thankful to reach the river bank & breathe the

the

The River Bank.

the fresh air once more. Here facing the river is the Sea Witch with ~~at~~ an erstwhile garden in front, ~~with~~ booths & stanches sloping down to the river. The garden however has been disused for some time and the whole place is covered with dirt & cement ~~&~~ dust.

Further south about 50 yards, is a house occupied by a foreman - River View - servant cleaning windows. Pink Red.

Back along the passage is a house at the N. corner of Sea Witch Lane Pink. Continuing northward, we come out on the river bank again. Just beyond Grandsley's Yard are two houses facing south, known as Grandsley's Cottages & occupied by foremen. Pink.

Continuing north round the Horseshoe the works of the Greenwich Inlaid Linoleum Company are reached. Large house here occupied by the manager. Red.

Continuing along the path which runs along the top of the river embankment until the Asbestos Works are reached (Oil Cake factory on map), open fields are reached & crossed eastward to main road. On the east side is an open square

square with buildings on three sides. On the north is Blakeley Cottages. 17 houses. 2 st. attic. Belong to Gas Co. & occupied by their work people - one family in each. Comfortable - foremen to Pink. The east side is the Livesey Mission Hall where a L.C.M. works. On the south side is :-

Blakeley Bldgs. 4 storied tenement block. with iron gallery in front to each floor. Much poorer than the cottages - belong to Gas Compt. Purple. The ground to the east & some distance north and south is occupied by the South Metropolitan Gas Company, their south boundary being only a short distance north of Board St. Head.

Back to main road. On the west side are two houses on the Asbestos Co's works occupied by foremen - pink. S to Ordnance Road. Part of west side including the Ordnance Arms has gone for the Tunnel. On the east side is Alpha Place. 2 st. cottages. Mostly labourers at wood paving yard &c. One house has broken windows mended with paper.

side are poor. Labouring men. L. 13. Purple or grey. W. into Teddington Place 2 st. houses on south side with separate entrance for each floor. Four narrow street doors next to each other. Poor. L. 13. Purple or grey. Coming out into the Main road, we are at the Tunnel entrance. On the west side is a large pub and a small house adjoining it. Going north on the west side of the Tunnel, Wood Paving Cottages are reached. Nine 2st. cottages with wash house & other conveniences in front. Men work in the wood paving works. Most would earn about 30/- a week but homes do not look up to this standard.

Pink to Purple. South end entrance to the Tunnel - engineer lives in rooms in the archway - to St heatman Street (see plan on page 11 for this & following sheets). 15 2-storeyed houses. Road not made up. All working people. Purple along Sigismund Street. West side only. 2st. 13 feet frontages. Narrow street - roadway not made up. Woman ~~says~~ asks when we are going to give them a pathway. Poor labouring class. L. 13 N up Blackwall Lane. Large coffee tavern at corner.

Greenfell Street. Six houses on south side 2 floors - 8 rooms. 2 families - all windows have long curtains & look comfortable. Pink. The street is overshadowed by a huge gasometer.

Boord Street St Andrews iron church is the only building on the south side. On the north are 15 2 st. houses built for 2 families.

Purple to pink. Across the fields to Marsh Lane. At east end is Ceylon Place.

(dated 1801) 2 st. houses facing north. On south are two little cubies leading to 9 back to back cottages (~~cots~~ Ceylon Cottages).

These like the backs of the houses in the lane are several feet below the level of the roadway. Further east the houses⁽²⁴⁾ are called River Terrace. Working people. Purple to L. B. At the river end of Marsh Lane is a large house formerly occupied by Mr Hill, now a caretaker is there.

Here. On the north side, facing the houses are the Electric Light Comp^{y's} works. The lane terminates in a landing stage (^{of Lane} Bugabys Hole) opposite which Cory's Coal derricks are moored.

Back along Marsh Lane. It is just one o'clock and we meet a succession of children - some 40 or 50 - taking dinners to the gasworks & other places - some carry two dinners. After leaving Ceylon Place the lane crosses open fields, some planted with rhubarb and crossed at intervals with ditches about 3 ft across. Near Blackwall Lane is a large horse slaughter place with a dwelling house, occupied by the foreman. Pink, Near this is a firework factory, with its little huts studded about the field. Away in the fields is a piggery with a ~~the~~ tumble down cottage, the last of the dwellings on the marsh.

Notes on the District

The chief interest of this East Greenwich promontory is its numerous manufactures fringing

fringing the river bank. These must provide employment for at least 3000 or 4000 men, probably more. The dwellings are subsidiary to the works, some, as Blakeley Cottages to be erected by employers for their work people.

The northern part is almost entirely absorbed by works, the only ^{large} pieces of open ground now available being between Wood Street and Tunnel Avenue. This tract is mainly market gardens rhubarb etc; it is ~~cross~~ below the level of the roads & crossed in various directions by ditches. The most popular diversion of the boys & girls appears to be jumping across & occasionally into these channels. Toward the south the land is suited for dwellings houses and I was rather surprised that with the exception of 4 of them no houses were being erected. Farther north the ground is lower & marshy & could not be used unless artificially raised.

The inhabitants, excepting a few managers & publicans, are all working men and nearly all would find their employment in one or other of the factories or at the river side.



With Detective Sergeant Hardy over district bounded on the north by Trafalgar Road, Blackwall Lane, Amritage Rd & part of Woolwich Road, east by Annandale Road; south by S. E. Railway, Maze Hill & Park Place & west by Park Row, being parts of the parishes of St Alphage and Christchurch.



Starting from corner of Trafalgar Road, south down Park Row. Row of 3 st houses on east side - bay window. All well kept & comfortable. All well kept and comfortable. Two families in some; others let apartments. Saw one servant. Police live here. Hardy regards it as like the north end: to me it is distinctly ~~poorer~~ less well to do.

Pink barred.

E. along Park Place $3\frac{1}{2}$ st. semi-det. houses facing park. All keep servants to East St. On opposite side is the Vicarage (Rev Brooks Lambert). East of East St are 2 conf. working class houses & a pub; then a row of old fashioned $3\frac{1}{2}$ st. houses - one is a school. Near the Congregational Church some modern 2 st. villas are erected on the site of an old institute. Farther east the old houses ad(3 $\frac{1}{2}$) are continued to Maze Hill. Doctors' offices. All keep one or two servants. Red.

North of this are 2 cottages LTB and a narrow entry looking north on Railway - Reeces Place 3 two storied cottages with small gardens in front. Labouring people LTB.

Crossing the Railway on the east is Clark's Blags. 3 st. tenement houses with a piece of waste ground in front. One + two room people - labourers, thieves, field hands +c. Women do some laundry work. Several of 'our boys' live here. As bad as Smiths Rents. LTB. barred black to DTB. North of the railway East Stell is much poorer, 2 & 3 st. houses. Broken windows, dirty blinds. Costers and labourers. DTB.

Trafalgar Road (Park Row to Park St). Only the Victory pub + Widow Smith's Almshouses on north side well

Maze Hill. On west side are 2 st houses looking like barracks, & built on the edge of the Park. Most have servants. Called Hospital Bldg. On the east side are large semi detached and ^{Red} detached houses; solicitor, soap boilers, merchant.

Keep several servants. Red to Yellow S to Creed Place. 2½ & 2 st. houses with small gardens.

Clean & comfortable. Tram drivers, mechanics & men working at Arsenal & Telegraph works. N. of Woodland Place the houses are older. One house garden ^{contains} has a plaster castle rockery &c. Pink.

General Notes The district south of Trafalgar
Road is distinctly better than that to the north;

This distinction is recognised locally & the people on the south regard those to the north generally as inferior to themselves.

Apart from the small area north of Woolwich Road, the poor patches included in this walk are the northern East Street & Clark's Bldgs, north of the Railway, and small group of old cottages between Creed Place and Woodland Street. This latter neighbourhood has been improved by the demolition of the courts to the east of Miles Street. This has reduced the area & improved Miles Street itself, which at the time of our previous inquiry was as bad as East Street.

Walk with Sergeant Howell over district on the north by the River Thames, west by Greenwich Marshes and Armitage Road, south by Lower Woolwich Road and the South Eastern Railway and east by West Street, being parts of the parishes of Christchurch & St George, Greenwich and Holy Trinity, Charlton.

Starting from corner of Woolwich Road, N up Collerston Road. 2 st houses 6 rooms. Mixed working class. Little better near main road than at north. Purple to LB.

At north end is Collerston Cottages. Two small blocks of L.C.C. dwellings like those in Armitage Road. Purple to Pink Tunnel Avenue at the north, leading to Blackwall Lane from the corner of Horn Lane & Woolwich Road is entirely unbuilt. The north east side is market gardens & open fields almost to the river. S along Selcourt Road. 2 st. 6 rooms. Poor at north end becoming better near the Woolwich Road. N. of Lenthope Road. LB, Purple to Glenister Road & Pink south. See working at the factories on the Marsh.

Lower Woolwich Road. On N side from Marsh Lane

to Hatcham St. is 3 st. shops. Moderate trade; lodges in top floor. Pink barred. Then 2 storeyed houses - shops - converted private houses - to Selcroft Road. East of this are a few 3 st. new shops & a Wesleyan Mission, the shop extending east of Marlton Street; & the market gardens then continue to Horn Lane. Pink to Pink barred. On the south side the Workhouse & board school take greater part of frontage to Annandale Road. Pub. 2 small shops by Calvert Road & 4 semi-detached houses & shop by Annandale Rd. Rather comfortable. Market Gardeners & others keeping servants. East of this is the Cemetery of the Greenwich Hospital & an old farm house now occupied by a market gardener. Pink barred

↑ up Denford Street. (turning leading into Glenforth Rd.). 3 houses (2 st) on west side. Were rough but have been cleared up & painted & now look Pink. ↑ up

Glenforth Street & A few 6 room'd houses with bay windows on west side. Remainder of street is modern 6 roomed houses built for 2 families & let in flats of 3 rooms & scullery for 7/6. Automatic gas meters &c. These have already given employment to the police, when people move out as is frequently the case, the neighbours


Note on District

Much of the ground immediately adjoining the Woolwich Rd has been covered ~~over~~ during the past ten years. North of the road little new building has been done, the only noticeable addition being the three new streets near the Tunnel Avenue.

General Notes. The greater part of this walk was in Charlton. The village still retains much of its old quaint appearance but the modern house is springing up on the N.W. and the bulk of the population is now located in the new streets south of the Woolwich Road. The people here have their business in London or Greenwich or Woolwich: they market in East Greenwich and all their interests lie in that direction rather than with the Village, which Woolwich has a strong influence on the place. The military officers live in nearly the better roads, whilst the Arsenal workmen live in the streets off the Woolwich Road. Two large electrical & mathematical instruments makers have their works here & several other large works engaged in this trade are situated just over the border. These ~~were~~ & a few laundries are the chief industries of the neighbourhood.




This completed the day's walk. Excepting the group of streets north of the railway, ^{and} ~~area is~~ a fringe by Westcombe Hill, the district is middle class. The social character of the district improves as the low ground by the railway is left & the hills toward Blackheath ascended, Westcombe Park Road being the best road. A considerable number of new houses are being built here and are occupied almost as quickly as they are finished. The superior finish & convenience of these newer houses has led people to leave the older houses & the houses to let in this neighbourhood are either the very large houses, as Vanburgh Castle, or houses that lack modern conveniences.



General Notes. This area contains very little poverty. The working class is confined almost entirely to a small, closely built area near the Charlton boundary. The remainder is well to do and near Blackheath wealthy. Roads are wide; houses have large gardens and trees abound so that the surroundings are pleasant. The neighbourhood has gone down somewhat as a residential place, chiefly I believe owing to the villainous railway services of the S.E.R & L.C. & S.Rly. Trains seldom keep their advertised times and in the winter it is not an infrequent thing for passengers to spend the best part of an hour in accomplishing the journey to or from London. A number of the larger houses are to let, chiefly in the Kidbrooke district but even here there are signs that the decline has reached its limit & that the place will again fill up. There are acres of ground southward suited for building.

General Remarks.

Many poor in this round. Half skilled Telegraph construction workers between Woolwich road & river. Poor, vicious & ugly in Morris St. out of Lower Stamford St. of Old Village property in Marshalls Grove & Railway Cottages. Morris St. is the ^{start} of all but the block of streets bet Woolwich Rd & river the largest area of poverty. If ever these streets did have looked attractive they w^t have done so today. Fine day, hot sun, cold wind, everything fresh after yesterdays rain. But there is something exceptionally dismal about the low lying streets N of the woolwich road. The Public Houses are not flaming or large, but there is the mark of drink upon houses & people. All the men w^t children are going. If trouble is to come out of the East in times of unemployment, it is from these streets & from those lying N of the railway in Battersea that the worst w^t come. The admixture of the military w^t make a crowd from Woolwich more difficult to deal with than other crowds. Men & women are strong & young & unskilled & drunken. If they were hungry they w^t be a real danger. In a new district like this there is no tradition of orderliness & their dirty, piecework, either as soap makers, cable works does not encourage sobriety or cleanliness.





Clyne said it was to the SE of London what
Nothing Dale ~~was~~ is to the N. West. It forms a
house of call for all the tramps from London
to Kent & vice versa. There is a regular alter-
change of tenants between this "Bangor St."
& Queen, Fifteen & Hale Streets in Deptford. Police
men from Nothing Dale find old friends in
Ropewalk Rials. The casual loafer fluctuates between
the two. When 'wanted' in one he is pretty sure
to be in ~~the~~ ⁱⁿ the others.

The male inhabitants are bullies, dock & waterside
labourers, costers, hawkers & tramps. The women
are prostitutes. In the area between the
Thames on the North, Warren Lane on the East;
Ropewalk Rials, High St & Mile St on the
west

west (in the Dark Hole). Clyne reckons between 70 & 80 known prostitutes - Since the law against belliars of last October year 45 men were ^{run in at} this charge & of this number 42 were convicted & sentenced to terms varying between £3 & 15 months with hard labour.

The lowest class of woman is of the rough and type of the Fenian Barracks in Bromley (Sile Box streets etc). The younger prostitute is in appearance 'the sailor's wife' of Ratcliffe Highway (Sage & Albert Streets); the clean white apron & the frizzed hair ^{rearing} is the mark of this class. Clyne says the majority of young soldiery male & female are Irish. No law runs in these streets. The constabulary is powerless & seldom seen.

The police only come when there is a bad row & they are summoned. No man w^t go alone. When called he waits for at least one other. Missiles are showered on them from every window when they interfere. It is out of bounds for soldiers & the military patrol can intercept & confine any soldier found there. But nevertheless the

LW

low class soldier goes there. The police know most them but have no right to arrest them.

If the man is known to have money or jewels on him he is never to hire a room & robbed; always cleaned out: if he has not enough to pay the woman then the street is used. There is no regular charge, each man pays as much as the woman can get from him.

The war has had great effect on the district, for the better. The hulks on coming out of prison will naturally return to their old ways but it is risky work now & there has been a great demand for workers. Neither dockyard nor private em-
ployers have gone strictly into the question of character. In consequence some have found employment & some have gone to the war.

Those who suffer most from the Dust Hole are the recruits - Woolwich is a depot: drifts constantly coming & going. These are the long files that are caught & may be ruined for life.





Small wooden railenged fronts : not much boast of in the way of flowers but a large number keep fowls or pigeons or rabbits. East of Griffin Rd the new houses are usually 2 storied but have less garden. Clyne said people preferred an extra room to a larger garden. In the new houses the extra room is built out behind over the wash house.

The tenants are arsenal workers. As laborers they earn 22/- per week, & just now are making much overtime. ^{Start at 8 AM,} They get home at 6, 8, 9, or 10 PM.

Their wives wash & their daughters do house-

-work for Woolwich clothing or garm. factories

The best part of today's round lies to the west of Pattison Rd, between Pattison Rd & Crescent Rd.

The poorer part & the new streets further east N of the Brewery Rd: these are all FK. exc the

S end of the Burrough Rd where Officers with their families live & lodge. The poorer streets lie between Glyndon Sts. & Hareholt road: some very poor but all with a considerable admixture of poverty. Clyne says that all round there a tendency to spend money & evenings in the public houses.

Then

are no counter attractions in the way of theatres or music halls. The pub is the club. Churches, chapels aband. They seem to me more frequent here than in any other part of London: but Ayne says that except Wilson's Tabernacle they have very little influence.

Fair views from the hill over Woolwich, over town & arsenal across grey river which broadens here, full red sails of barges & cement barges, tall black chimneys belching volumes of black smoke rising from a bed of white steam, bright green of marshes in the eastern foreground etc etc - This afternoon there were occasional flashes on the marsh followed by a crash which made even the windows on the hillside shake.



On a bicycle through the streets of Woolwich between 10 & 12.30 PM. on a visit to the Woolwich music hall. While staying with H.F. Donaldson at Wood Lodge Shooters Hill.

Leaving Shooters Hill at 9.45. I got to the market place about 10 minutes after 10 - it is down hill the whole way. Fine night, stars, rather cold but practically no wind.

All dark quiet until New road was reached. Then the crowd began. Many soldiers in uniform. Shops all lighted & open, booths on the W side of the street leading to the Market Place. All good humored & well dressed, not for marketing & to see the fun or for a form snack simply men women & children. All young. Children from babies in arms to 10 years old, husbands between 20 & 35 & women of the same ages, hardly a gray hair or an old face among them all. A few soldiers almost tipsy opposite the public house at the corner

of

Saturday night in the Market Place, Woolwich

of the New Road, Thomas street, a small crowd watching them & listening to nigger minstrels playing at the door. The civilians were sober. In the market there was greater seriousness. Most coming away with their purchases in large brown paper newspaper wrappers as I arrived, but a good number still buying at the market place full though not as thickly crowded as it had been a little earlier. The men never carried the parcels except where the woman had the child & not always then. Men in caps & bowlers, collars, a few with black coats but most in ordinary suits of jitters. Women in bonnets, cloaks; not quite in their best but like the men evidently dressed for the occasion.

Two or three labourers were in their working clothes but they were exceptions.

The chief interest centred round the butchers stall.

Flower stalls were doing a good business in bedding out plants - flowers & vegetables.

Other stalls were for tools, fancy goods (purses, lace etc) - cloth caps - oranges etc - shooting stall - It was a smaller & less busy market than Lower Marsh (Lambeth) but of the same character.

After the market the flow of the crowd was towards Parry & Star streets. These streets contain the best shops in Woolwich - Large Drapery stores - grocers - public houses - boot shops - bacon & cheese shops. Fair small strawberries were on sale at 8d lb & good cherries at 6d lb. Cherries found more buyers than the strawberries. Distant was a large new shop at the corner of Star & Parry's streets.

Crowd good tempered sober, more promenade than business. Such business as was done was ~~done in~~ ^{in the} side than outside the shops.

After the butchers' shops the boot shops were the best lighted, made the best show. After them came the public houses -

the Dark hole - Rope yard rails was quiet, dark - the kitchens of the Lodging houses as far as could be seen from outside with only a few persons in them. Not much being done in the beer house - One man asleep drunk on the pavement, most doors open. Shell of light. Dark stains along the pavement on either side were men & women had relieved nature - Badly lighted, figures w^d emerge suddenly from dark corner & disappear again as mysteriously as they had come. Some old men & women of the drappled tramp type were laboriously slinking down the street to ward the Canal Ward lodging house as I passed - The first & next obvious improvement in these streets w^d be to light them better - In High St^r was a few rough women but not many men - Rodney Street & the turnings off it were empty, dark & quiet - Warren Lane also dark & like Rope yard rails -

Then I went to the Music Hall in Bessford Street, The last piece was already on: a military piece called 'Drunken art'. The manager said he w^d not charge me anything as it was so near the end

Woolwich Theatre

(it was about 10.45), but hoped I wd come again. I went to the
dress circle (proper price 1/-). Theater crammed; about
2000 people: not more than 12 soldiers in uniform
& hardly 50 women. The rest all young men & boys.
Near the aisle of the pit (which here includes the stall)
was taken by boys & youths between 14 & 18.

The average age of the whole of the audience or
here worked out I think, at under 25. All quiet,
orderly & washed & brushed & dressed for the
occasion. The scene shewed part of Woolwich
baracks & the acting consisted in ordinary
military duties being performed on the stage -
sentry duty, changing guard, parade, band etc
etc mixed with comic figures (the regimented cook)
& the Irish grand mother of a drummer boy: the
catchwords of the comic characters very well
known to the audience. The boys in the pit shouted
them out as soon as the actor appeared & were
chaffed in return by the actors from the stage.
Drummed out 'was the set piece' & made the ^{210th}
last turn of the evening. The earlier turns had
been of the usual music hall type - I left
about

The Audience & the Piece.

Plumstead Road.

The Dust Hole at 12.15.

There was no noise from these groups of men & women; they were round the open house doors in groups like conspirators: now & then a voice of rise but it never went as far as a shout now.

11.15 I again went round the Dust Hole. All was as before - Then I bicycled on into Plumstead, the shops were all open though not doing much business: the whole of the Plumstead road is a shopping street. No drunkennes nor noise. I turned back at the Riversdale Rd. Crowds were then coming from Woolwich to Plumstead, more drunk, all walking fast & disappearing into the dark streets & ends of the Plumstead Road. Many more men than women, only a few children about.

I got back to the Dust Hole about ten minutes after closing time (i.e. 12.10). more life in the streets, but no quarrelling. women & men had just been turned out of the public houses.

The two worst places were opposite Mahoneys Lodging house in the High St. opp. the S end of Rope yard Rials & again in the narrow street which rises rather steeply out of Rodney St. & is called Globe Lane.

In Rodney street itself the windows were nearly all dark except one at the first floor which was open, through which could be seen bonneted heads.

& from which came the sound of a patriotic music hall song: evidently a small evening party.

In the market everyone was packing up & going off in barrows & pony carts. One joint of beef which before has been 6d was now 3d lb: the last few pieces were being sold off at great reductions.

Only the poorest buying now: one woman not liking to do more than whisper into the ear of the ~~poor~~ ^{old} salesman, the price that she was prepared to pay.

Then I went back past the barracks seeing a good number of soldiers who at only just walk & turning into the block of four bolt streets off the East side of Woolwich common - all quiet here: the little general shops at the end of Manor St still open, a child buying some thing: S down James St E, & up Dicey St, poor & rough; fewer people in bed, more lighted windows & open doors than in the other streets, no man but has all the appearance of a rough poor street:

Speaking about the earnings of the police:

The ordinary P.C starts at 24/- & rises each year for 8 yrs to 32/. Then he stops. His next rise is to Sergeant. Then to Station Sergeant. Then Inspector & the height of his ambition is to be Superintendent.

One shilling is paid to the police by postman for early calling.

Not much extra service money: The Theatre is the most regular employer but the job is not much liked as between 5-20 persons have to be put out for disorderly behaviour every week.

There are 70 men at the Woolwich station & not more than 10/- is their average yearly sharing of money earned by special service out of a man's wages: 1/- is taken weekly from an unmarried man being 1/- for lodgings: 3/- for the pension fund: 1/- for the band: 1½/- for the orphans Widows fund.



Roughness, less than it used to be: a rough street police make a point of knowing men by name right. In the new streets large houses are more valued than large gardens.


